Committee chairmen were appointed and plans for the year's work were discussed.

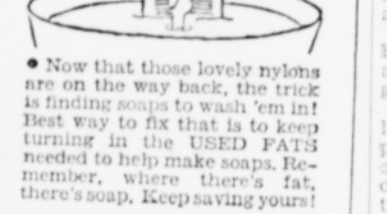
Patrick Vandehey Weds in South
