

Obligation at Home To Vets Said Great

Considering the large number of servicemen returning to their homes at the present time it is going to take just about everything a community has to meet their needs, R. S. Hill, American Red Cross field director of Portland, said at a monthly meeting of the Washington county ARC chapter here last Thursday.

If we do not meet these needs there is bound to be an upheaval, the veterans' administration great speaker said. The American Red Cross has promised protection to the veteran and his family. We must bear in mind that we cannot forget that promise, Hill said.

Eighty per cent of all claims filed with the veterans' administration to date have been filed through the Red Cross, he said. The organization now has three battlefronts: (1) men overseas, (2) discharged veterans, (3) army and navy hospitals. Hill said the Red Cross is going into veterans' hospitals with the same service it has carried on in army and navy hospitals.

Service to men overseas includes recreation and assistance with personal problems. Assistance is given the discharged man in his struggle

in making the transition to civilian life.

Hill said there were 308,000 in army and navy hospitals on November 30, 1945. The following are future estimates: February, 1946, 490,000; June, 1946, 162,000; June, 1947, 45,000.

Mrs. Josephine David, special fund campaign field director from the area office, spoke on the regional fund drive conference held in Portland on January 7. She gave an over-all picture of the budget to be reached and problems to be met in raising money. She told of experiences at a Red Cross worker in New Guinea.

Chairman J. T. Kovaly stated that only temporary housing for the different local services of Red Cross has been procured and pointed out the need for a permanent home for the organization in view of the anticipated need for Red Cross services in the future.

O. B. Gates of Hillsboro is chairman of a committee appointed to investigate this problem. Other members of the committee: R. W. Weir, Mrs. Mildred Anderson, and Mrs. Edith Burnett, all of Hillsboro; Marian Talbert of Beaverton; and

Mrs. Mary L. Roberts of Forest Grove.

Mervin W. Brink, county chairman for the war funds drive in Washington county to be held in March, was introduced and he spoke briefly on plans for the campaign.

Motor Corps, Mrs. Claude Weir, chairman—Six polo trips, 21 hours; 312 miles; one trip camp and hospital, six hours, 50 miles; one trip George Washington, two hours, 23 miles; four girls did volunteer work; total, 29 hours, 400 miles.

Camp and Hospital, Mrs. Arlene Anderson, chairman—437 Christmas boxes delivered to Red Cross center, Portland; also five scrapbooks and 20 pocket-size story books.

Pattern for Peace Topic Coffee Club Meeting Friday

"Are we really going to have peace or just talk about it?" That was the question asked by Mrs. Walter Giersbach of Forest Grove, guest speaker at the Coffee Club meeting Friday afternoon at the chamber of commerce. Her subject was "Patterns for Peace."

"Correct patterns are essential, and they carry them through to completion," she said. "There are patterns in all life, in the sea, the clouds, stars, art, mathematics, etc. We learn in life as in sewing, by the trial and error method." As illustration she told of buying a dress for a party and later was unable to find the pattern. Also of buying a 15-cent pattern to make another dress. This went along beautifully until she tried to put in the last sleeve, when she discovered she had cut both sleeves another dress. The two patterns were useless, one by loss and one by error.

Pattern for Peace is more intricate, the speaker said. Man is not perfect as God. Peace will be procured by trial and error. The attempt at a world peace after World War I overlooked an essential factor, education and understanding of peoples of different countries. This time the UNO peace-makers are stressing that point.

As we understand people we work better with them. Look upon countries as people striving to get along. In closing, Mrs. Giersbach quoted Cordell Hull: "The will to peace must spring from the hearts and minds of men everywhere, if it is to achieve enduring peace."

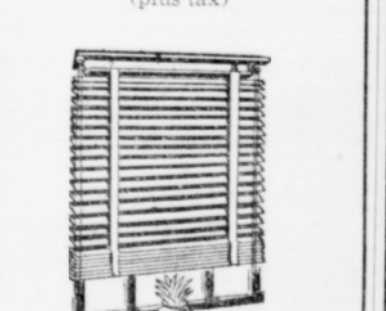
