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1st Baptist Church Host to Week-Long Preaching Mission

Services at First Baptist church in Hillsboro on Sunday night at 7:30 will open a week's preaching mission by Dr. Charles Durden, who led the United churches of this city in a successful visitation program.

Rev. J. F. Scheerling has extended an invitation to the community for everyone who is interested to attend the week-long mission. Dr. Durden is pastor-evangelist at the present time at Clatsop church in Salem. He was for many years pastor of the Great First Baptist church of Omaha, Neb.

The sermon Monday will be upon the Book of Revelation and the program will close with a candlelight service. Dr. Durden will stress the claims of Christ for loyal discipleship Tuesday. Wednesday's sermon will deal with the life of Elijah. The visiting pastor Thursday will discuss a most unusual copy of Hoffman's "Christ in Gethsemane" which was pointed out by a member of the Royal family of Sweden.

The church will be arranged for a wedding Friday and Dr. Durden will relate many experiences at weddings and will tell of interesting wedding customs, going through a wedding service at the close of the evening.

Missionaries to Tell Experiences Of Jap Internment

Rev. and Mrs. Randall Whetzel, Portland-educated couple who were interned by the Japanese in April of 1942 and separated for three and one-half years, will tell of their adventures Sunday at the Baptist Gospel chapel on Fifth and Baseline roads.

Rev. Whetzel will speak on the subject of "Life and Death in a Japanese Prison Camp" at the evening service, which starts at 8 o'clock. Mrs. Whetzel will speak in the young people's service at 7 o'clock.

Rev. and Mrs. Whetzel founded their first mission on the island of Batjan and were making great progress when the Japs attacked Pearl Harbor. When first interned they were taken to Ambon, then later to Makassar, Celebes, where Rev. Whetzel was separated from his wife and three-year-old daughter.

The couple in 1949 were sent out by their church, the Immanuel Temple, to become pioneer missionaries to the Spice Islands of the Dutch East Indies. They traveled part of the way by plane and the rest of the way on a tramp steamer and entered an island where no white man had ever set foot.

State Federation Honors Local Club "Woman of Week"

(News Editor's Note: The following item was written about a plea of Mrs. McKinney to "play it dead" for the use of the above space for paying tribute to Hillsboro's outstanding woman.)

Honor of a high degree came Friday to Mrs. Emma C. McKinney, co-publisher and associate editor of the Argus, when she was named "Woman of the Week" on the Oregon Federation of Women's clubs' program. In the announcement over radio station KOAC at Corvallis tribute was paid Mrs. McKinney for her long-time personal wholehearted participation in every activity toward betterment of the community.

It was pointed out that Mrs. McKinney has been active as well in the city's fraternal and social affairs. She is a charter member of the Hillsboro Business and Professional Women's club and in May will complete 10 years as editor of the Oregon Business woman, published by the Oregon Federation of Business and Professional Women's clubs.

Mrs. McKinney is a long-time member of the Hillsboro Coffee club, woman's civic organization having served several years as president some years ago and is again president of the organization.

She is a past chief of the Hillsboro Pothens Sisters, past grand chief of the Oregon Pothens Sisters and past supreme representative of the order. She is a past president and charter member of the Hillsboro American Legion Auxiliary.

She has been on the city planning commission since it was formed, is director and publicity chairman of Washington county chapter of the Red Cross and publicity chairman of Washington County Public Health association.

Mrs. McKinney's accomplishments in the newspaper field were cited at length. She is recognized as dean of Oregon newspapers and has been publisher or co-publisher of the Argus for nearly 42 years—since April 4, 1904. Her service record dates back even several years further when she was connected with the Hillsboro Independent.

It was mentioned that Hillsboro's outstanding woman has been in the same business longer than anyone else in town, that during her several decades at the helm of the Argus her sole aim has been to provide a newspaper with a standard of excellence in consistency with the standing and needs of the community.

The broadcaster mentioned that the veteran newspaper woman is immediate past president of the N.E.A. The co-publishers were lauded for their "all out" support of the war effort and war-time activities and for space given for promotion of war bond drives, war chest campaigns, Red Cross financial and activities drives, etc.

A lovely oration, presented by Tommy Luke, Portland florist, arrived at Mrs. McKinney's home shortly after the broadcast. Selection of the "Woman of the Week" is made on the basis of the following attributes: Activity in community affairs, qualities of leadership, sincerity and understanding, international viewpoint, genuine co-operation on worthwhile projects, and success in homemaking.

Coincidentally, arriving the same week, the January 5 issue of Publishers' Auxiliary, a national publication devoted to the best interests of newspaper people, proclaimed W. Verne McKinney the "Editor of the Week" and gave a resume of his local, state and national newspaper activities.
