Foundation for infantile paralysis in the fight against the dread disease.

Governor Snell's proclamation in part: "I have designated Sunday, January 27, as Infantile Paralysis Day in Oregon. Coming as it does near the end of the March of Dimes campaign, it should serve as a reminder that the disease can be conquered, must be conquered, and will be conquered."

"Since infantile paralysis first attracted public attention, 1945 has witnessed the fourth worst period of polio experienced in the medical record of the United States. No one knows who will be stricken next and the disease is not confined to infants, notwithstanding its common designation. The source of the disease is still a mystery despite the research of scientists."

To combat the encroachment of the disease, it is necessary to conduct an unremitting battle against this terror which is leaving a wreckage of young lives across the continent. The funds received from voluntary contributions are urgently needed in this warfare."
