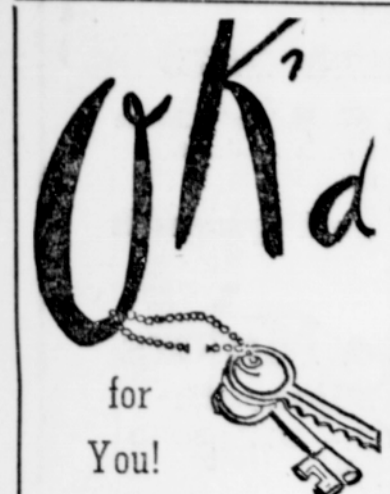


Catholic Daughters Initiate Class of 25

Miss Margaret McDevitt of Court Fendleton was guest speaker.

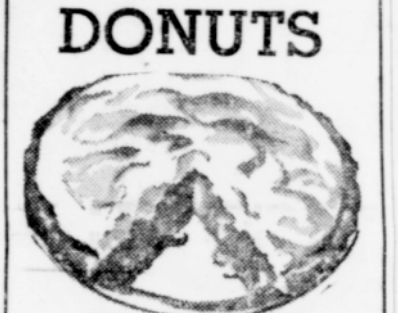
