Beaverton Sets Bond Election

A \$230,000 bond election for Beaverton union high school district No. 10, which lies in both Washington and Multnomah counties, has been called for February 23 by directors of the district. Voting will be at the high school building between 2 and 7 p. m., it was announced.

The money is needed for three new units to the high school structure as part of a project estimated in excess of \$500,000. Proposed buildings would include a classroom wing, expanded vocational and gymnasium facilities, and an auditorium. The project is to be undertaken only if the district can secure federal assistance under a public works program.
