

"Youth for Christ" Meeting Sunday

Dr. Fred D. Jarvis, the dynamic preacher-magician from Berkeley, Cal., will be Sunday's speaker at the Washington county "Youth for Christ" rally at Forest Grove. Dr. Jarvis has been widely used speaking in some of the nation's largest churches and in "Youth for Christ" rallies across the country. Though still a young man he has had a very diversified background of experience as a pastor, evangelist, and educator.

He completed nine full years of college, university and seminary in six years and in the short space of two years received four graduate degrees. A former professor of

psychology and philosophy, Dr. Jarvis' chief interest is the establishment of a Christian radio station and college in China. It is for this purpose that he expects to sail to China this summer. Sunday's message will be slanted for youth and he will employ an array of mystifying magic tricks to illustrate the truths of the Christian faith.

This first Washington county "Youth for Christ" rally promises to be a big event. Also featured will be Dr. Frank Phillips, director of Portland Y.F.C., who will act as master of ceremonies. Washington county youth will also be on the program, as well as outstanding talent from the Portland "Youth for Christ." This first rally has been arranged by the joint youth councils of Forest Grove and Hillsboro. The next rally is planned for Hillsboro high on March 17. The Forest Grove high school auditorium will be open at 2:30 with the program scheduled to begin at 3 o'clock. Buses will transport youth from all parts of the county. Hillsboro's young people have chartered two buses that will leave the Christian church in Hillsboro at 2:30.

Coffee Club Hears Of Race Problems At Patriotic Meet

Pointing out that Wendell Wilkie was a great American because he was a Jew, "One World" Mrs. George L. Thomas of Portland began her address on "Problems of Minority Groups" before the Coffee club Friday afternoon.

"It is no longer possible to live and behave as individual nations or groups. We are one world with common problems. She deplored the habit we have of condemning a whole group for the misbehavior of single individuals. "We do not condemn the white race because the crimes of Tea Pot Dome. We ought not to condemn the Negro race because individuals of that race commit crimes."

"We are inconsistent. We say the Negro is lazy and shiftless, but when we want to tell how hard we work we say, 'I worked like a nigger.' She pointed to the achievement of many in the Negro race in science, invention, administration, the professions and many other fields. Their contributions to our American culture are not inconsiderable. She said the Negro seeks political freedom, economic fair play, educational opportunity and reasonable consideration in every day living. "The signs in many Portland restaurants — We cater to white trade only — insulting. The filibuster in the U. S. senate is a resort to undemocratic means."

She said peoples from other countries, particularly South America, cannot understand a policy which takes "good neighborliness" and decries common justice to people in our own country as well as visiting neighbors because their skins are dark. The sincerity of our democracy is being tested. Three-fourths of the people on earth have skins other than white. She closed by urging women of such groups as the club to be fair in thinking, careful in their talking, and kind in their behavior. "You can help us. We need you."

Mrs. Thomas is the wife of George L. Thomas, chairman of the race relations committee of the Council of Churches of Portland.

Mrs. Ada Patterson, chairman of the program, in her introductory remarks paid tribute to the famous people of the nation who had birthdays in February, the late presidents, Washington and Lincoln; Mrs. Susan B. Anthony, reformer, and Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, poet. She said it was fitting that our speaker should discuss a subject so dear to the heart of Abraham Lincoln.

Mrs. Patterson also announced that the club president, Emma McKinney, had been awarded the "Woman of the Week" honor by Oregon Federation chapter. She said that Mrs. McKinney had been in the newspaper business for more than 40 years, had reared a son who had received high honors in the national newspaper field, and that she had been an active worker in the community. Mrs. McKinney was then presented with a lovely gardenia corsage by the club, the presentation being made by Mrs. R. L. Burnett.

The musical program included singing and accordion selections by Shirlene Jean and Marian Rice, and assembly singing of songs of Lincoln and Washington times led by Mrs. W. B. Chandler with Mrs. Fred Sewell as accompanist.

The club voted to donate \$5 to the infantile paralysis fund.

Two Distinctive Meals with Low-Cost Meats

Many of my most appealing menus are planned around inexpensive cuts of meat. Here are two of my best liked dinners that are sure to bring you compliments from guests or family.

OLD-FASHIONED BOILED DINNER

Don't forget this old favorite for a wintry day. Here are two of my best liked dinners that are sure to bring you compliments from guests or family.

1. Like to serve it with hot corn bread or cornmeal muffins and a frosted apple dumpling for dessert. I always pass some of the "pot liquor" and a bowl of mustard-horseradish sauce.

To serve 6, simmer 4 or 5 pounds of boiling beef (choose short ribs, brisket, plate or chuck for this) in a large kettle for 3 or 4 hours or until tender. About 1/2 hour before serving time place on top of the meat 5 medium-sized peeled potatoes, carrots, white turnips, onions, cabbage wedges and parsnips. Sprinkle lightly with salt and cover tightly. Simmer until vegetables are done. Arrange attractively on a large platter around the meat, keeping all of one kind of vegetable together.

POT ROAST WITH RICH VEGETABLE GRAVY

Here's gravy that's really something. For a Sunday dinner I like to serve pot roast and gravy and accompany it with fluffy mashed potatoes, broccoli with lemon butter, grapefruit and avocado salad with French dressing, whole wheat biscuits and lemon chiffon pie.

Brown a 4 or 5 pound pot roast in hot shortening in a large kettle, turning often. (I usually select one of the chuck roasts or a rump roast to pot roast.) Add 1 to 2 cups water or tomato juice. Put 3 or 4 cut-up tops and outside stalks of celery, a peeled potato, a carrot, a large onion, some leaves of cabbage, parsley and any left-over vegetables you have on hand in the kettle with the pot roast. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Cover tightly and simmer slowly several hours or until meat is tender, adding more liquid if necessary. When done, remove meat and press vegetables through colander along with the liquid. Season the vegetable gravy to taste with salt and pepper, a few drops of Worcestershire or gravy sauce. I find the mashed vegetables thicken the gravy sufficiently. But if you like thicker gravy, then it may be thickened with flour and water.
