Miss Slocum, RN Visits in County

Miss Olive Slocum, R.N., staff member of the University of Oregon department of nursing, visited with the nurses of the county health department last Thursday. She also visited on the campus of Pacific University.

According to Miss Slocum's message, nursing offers the biggest and most profitable field of professional life for girls, with better opportunities for advancement than ever before.
In practically every field of specialized nursing the demand for college trained professional women is far greater than the supply, Miss Slocum said.
Girls planning to go to college can take two years of a pre-professional curriculum on the campus of their choice and then spend 30 months in the professional curriculum on the University of Oregon medical school campus in Portland. This program earns them a bachelor of science degree in nursing education. It opens the way to specialized work in public health nursing, orthopedics, teaching, administration and other fields.
Girls interested in this most worthwhile profession are advised to write directly to Miss Slocum at the medical school, or if they wish to first discuss their plan locally, arrange for a conference with Miss Corinne Pennington, supervising nurse of the Washington county health department.
