Harold Thompson, assistant manager of the Hillsboro store, will leave about the first of March to replace McCaw at the Lakeview store. Mr. and Mrs. Thompson have been employed here since December. Prior to that he worked in Portland for a short time follow-

ing discharge from the army October 19, 1945. Thompson was employed at the Sunnyside variety store in the Sunnyside, Wash., prior to his entry in service in May, 1942. He was overseas for 39 months with the engineers serving in France, Belgium, Holland, and through Germany with the 7th and 9th armies. He holds the ETO ribbon with five battle stars, Presidential unit citation, and four contact medals. Mr. and Mrs. McCaw went to Lakeview from Nevada. He was elected councilman at Lakeview last year, was prominent in round-up affairs, and active on Rotary committees for a number of years. Westfall said his plans for the future are indefinite. He will be here a time after the arrival of McCaw, assisting the new manager.

Farmington Road Improvement Set

Oregon state highway commission has announced that bids will be opened February 25 for regrading, widening and adding 4.96 miles on the Campbell bridge-Hazeldale section of the Farmington highway. This is one of 11 projects for an estimated \$2,000,000 in postwar highway work to be opened for bids in Portland, February 25 and 26. It will be the fourth letting of bids in the state's \$26,000,000, three-year postwar highway program. The Washington county improvement is to be a federal project.
