

"Youth for Christ" Meeting a Success

The Washington county "Youth for Christ" made its final debut Sunday afternoon, February 17, at the Forest Grove union high school auditorium with an estimated 600 people attending.

Dr. Phillips, master of ceremonies, rose to his feet and the audience rose when "America" was played. Two ministers, one on either side of the auditorium, carried the Christian and United States flags to the stage. The meeting was then opened with a prayer.

The song leader, Dr. Swanson, director of Vancouver "Youth for Christ," then led the audience in a peppy song service. Following this, the men's male quartet sang two numbers, on a request chorus, "On the Jericho Road."

A group of high school students from Hillsboro and Forest Grove gave "burning testimonies." The testimonies were called "burning" because each speaker held a lighted match, and if the testimony were lengthy, the results might well be "burning." Youth for Christ is a testimonial of a meeting testifying very popular for it does away with the long self-revelation testimonies.

Following the singing of more hymns and choruses, the quiz kids came forward for a battle of wits with Hillsboro and Forest Grove high in competition. The Hillsboro team came out winner.

Jimmy Dunn, a Portland high school student, enthralled the audience with his rendition of two well known hymns on his harp.

Dr. Fred Jarvis, magician-preacher, was then introduced and entertained with his "bag of tricks." Later, Dr. Jarvis stepped to pulpit and started to preach. Dr. Jarvis spoke of the wonders of the universe, the creative work of God's Son, The Lord Jesus Christ. He spoke of the wonder of this earth to pay the penalty of man's sin by being a cruel death on the cross of Calvary.

Dr. Jarvis spoke only 20 minutes and then white heads were bowed and the quartet softly sang "Hymns of Invitation, all those who Saviour or dedicate their lives to Him, were asked to raise their hands in response to the invitation.

Dr. Cramer Speaks At P.T.A. County Council Meeting

"The modern high school has changed from a classical college preparatory school to a terminal institution," according to Dr. F. J. Cramer, director of the extension division of higher education, when he spoke at the P.T.A. county council meeting here February 12.

Dr. Cramer continued, "Now we are balancing the high school course so that it will continue to include formal academic information, mathematics and natural science, technical training. Every student should have at least enough language, literature, social science, mathematics and natural science to understand the social and natural world in which he lives. Then there should be some familiarity with the cultural and recreational subjects for further development. In addition, there should be technical training for every day living and a chance to explore certain basic vocations."

"Counseling, especially vocational, is a much needed service in high schools and still do not have enough," according to Dr. Cramer, who concluded with the statement, "The United States has the only educational system open to everyone."
