Sgt. Hudson Jr. Presumed Dead

Sgt. John A. Hudson, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Hudson of Forest Grove, missing over Hawaii, Germany, since January 17, 1945, is presumed to be dead, according to word from the war department to his parents.

Sgt. Hudson, a gunner in the air corps, received a air medal and three oak leaf clusters for his overseas service from January of 1944 until January, 1945.

The B-24 Liberator shot down and exploded in mid-air. The entire crew was reported missing. Sgt. Hudson was 25 and the second of three sons in the service. He was a graduate of Forest Grove high school and is survived by his parents; three brothers, Elmo of Forest Grove, Lt. Roger Hudson at Fort Ogilthorpe, Ga., James with the occupation forces in Germany; and a sister, Joanne (Cut courtesy The Oregon Journal).
