To bring a settlement in the big steel strike and in the interest of industrial peace, President Truman announced a new wage-price policy, which permits easier price increases for employers who raise wages to assure industry of pre-war profits.

BIBLE QUESTIONS ANSWERED BY THE VOICE OF PROPHECY

Question.—In Acts 19:13 the Bible speaks of "exorcists." What are they? Answer.—Exorcists were people who professed to cast out evil spirits by using words and ceremonies.

Q.—Is Palestine about the size of California? A.—No. Not so large even as San Bernardino County in California. Palestine is about 150 miles long and 50 miles wide, approximately one-fourth the size of Indiana.

Q.—Does it say in the Bible that "there are those who are born to be damned"? A.—Those words are not found in the Scripture. The Bible says: "whosoever will, let him take the water of life freely." Revelation 22:17.

Q.—Where is Mount Ararat where Noah's ark is stranded? A.—The mountain now called Ararat is near the junction of Armenia, Turkey, and Iran. It has two peaks, the higher being 15,916 feet in elevation. It was climbed in 1829 by Parrot, and in 1859 by Colonel Kheozko and his party of sixty. They did not report seeing the ark.

Q.—Does God call some special ones to minister, or does He call all of us? A.—Yes, to both questions. God calls all believers to be His witnesses, but certain persons are called to give their whole time to the ministry. Christ called the twelve apostles. (Matthew 10.) He sent forth the seventy. (Luke 10:1-16.) In Ephesians 4:11 it is written: "He gave some, apostles; and some, prophets; and some, evangelists; and some, pastors and teachers."
