

Hillsboro Host For F.F.A. Competition

Lower Willamette Valley Future Farmers of America shop and public speaking contest will be held at Hillsboro union high school Saturday, March 2, with nine schools scheduled to compete for honors, according to J. B. Thomas, local vocational shop and agriculture instructor.

Public speaking contest is scheduled for 10 a. m. at the auditorium with schools limited to one entrant apiece. Speakers will use a topic of their own choice and are to talk from eight to 10 minutes. Four minutes will be given for each boy to defend his composition under questioning of the judges.

Judges of the speech contest will be E. H. Greenwood of Portland, secretary of the Oregon Bankers' association; and A. H. Abts and C. T. Richardson of Hillsboro. A story telling contest will be held during the noon meal at the cafeteria.

The shop and agriculture contests will start at 1 p. m. with competition held in the following: welding, acetylene welding, blacksmith, roller framing, soldering, drill sharpening, rope halter, milk testing, seed identification and farm accounting.

Two or three entrants are expected from each school for the afternoon contests. Instructors from the schools will be in charge of judging. Thomas announced that the following schools have indicated plans to send entries: Amity, Indented, Nestucca, Banks, McMinnville, Newberg, Dayton, and Forest Grove.

South America depends on us and we on them, Sloan pointed out. It would be better if they looked at us—not with admiration—but as a helpful brother.
