Merchant Marine Gives Opportunity

High school seniors who make application for appointment to the United States Merchant Marine Cadet corps and pass the examination on April 3 will be able to finish high school and receive their diplomas in May or June. It has been announced. Applications must be postmarked not later than midnight March 1, 1946, to be considered for the examination. Successful candidates will not be assigned to the cadet schools before July 1, 1946.

Honorably discharged veterans of the merchant marine and armed services up to the age of 24 years will be considered for appointment as cadet-midshipmen. The regulation age for non-veterans is 19½ to 21 years.
