Social Circle Has "Youth" Program; Colonial Party

The Social Circle of the Congregational church met last Thursday, Mrs. J. B. Chapman presented the members of her Sunday school class in two acts and a flannel picture playlet, "The Good Samaritan." Mrs. Wesley Foster sang "In My House," and Mrs. E. G. Cooper recited two short selections.

Miss Gertrude Boyd Crane, professor of psychology at Pacific university, spoke on "Youth." She presented as one reason for the lack of understanding between youths and adults of today, the fact that youth belongs to the present moment. Another difference in background age between the adults grew into this age. The radio, the airplane, the everyday uses of electricity are commonplace to today's youth. Another difference in background is the fact that present youth has grown up through war and depression. Because of these background differences youth's outlook is necessarily different from that of the adult. Another point Miss Crane stressed is that the present generation is better educated because of the better facilities for education and the greater breadth of curriculum common to today. Miss Crane urged a willingness on the part of the adult to face the present, to accept a broader, less selfish viewpoint, and to try looking at reality with the new generation. In each generation children suffer for the mistakes of the elders. Adults should make every effort to adjust themselves to the fact that tomorrow is a very different day from yesterday, said the speaker.

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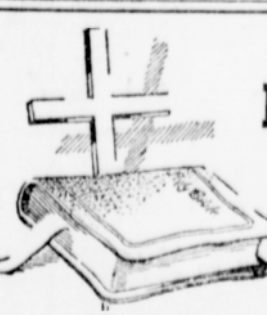
