Mrs. Albert Charles Phillips, artist and world traveler, entertained members of the Forest Grove Hillsboro branch of the American Association of University Women and their guests with an account of her experiences in Italy and Tunisia just prior to the outbreak of war. Her talk followed a luncheon meeting Saturday at the Episcopal parish hall.

Highlights of her charming travelogue were a visit to Monte Cassino and a Christmas spent in Rome. She brought with her numerous illustrations of Italian art and architecture.

Mrs. Phillips spent 13 years studying in Europe and speaks several languages fluently. She studied the piano and harp in France and enjoyed the distinction of being the youngest woman admitted to the University of Berlin. She teaches art in Seattle, was instrumental in founding the art museum there and is a member of its board of directors. Mrs. Wilbur S. 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Dr. Bloomquist WCPHA Speaker Here Tuesday

Dr. Edward T. Bloomquist, director of tuberculosis division of the state board of health, and Miss Mary Jane Green of the state tuberculosis association office, were speakers at the meeting of Washington County Public Health Association Tuesday afternoon in the office of Mrs. Zola Morgan, executive secretary. Dr. Bloomquist, U. S. Army, stated that more men than women are victims of tuberculosis, susceptible ages being from 25 to 60 for men, and 20 to 35 for women.

In speaking of the benefits derived from periodic chest X-rays, he said that if everybody would be X-rayed each year tuberculosis would probably be stamped out in 10 years. He advised everyone to take advantage of the free X-rays during the visits of the Mobile Chest X-ray units in this county from March 11 to 16, inclusive.

The only way to beat T. B. is to find it case by case, the earlier the better, said Miss Green, who stressed the fact that all industrial plant workers should be X-rayed. She also answered questions about the disease and the workings of the mobile unit. Area chairmen were present from Gaston, Forest Grove, Hillsboro and Tigard.

Monday evening, April 8, has been designated as the date of the meeting of WCPHA, at which time officers will be elected.

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New Law Sets Budget Terms

Taxpayers appointed to serve on all local committees in Washington county to fix budgets for the 1946-47 fiscal year, must be appointed on a new tenure basis under a 1945 state law that becomes effective this spring.

Counties, cities, school districts, PUDs, port, water and all other tax-leaving districts must appoint budget committee taxpayer "freeholders" for one, two and three year periods. This is a change from previous practice of appointing budget committee members to serve for only one year. Directors or the governing body of any tax-leaving municipal corporation by resolution must designate one-third of the appointed citizen members of a budget committee, or approximately one-third, to serve for one year, one-third to serve for two years, and one-third of the taxpayer budgeters to serve for three years.

This change in term of service on local budget committees was contained in House Bill 60 of the 1945 legislature, a bill introduced by Representative E. W. Kimberling, Prairie City, Grant and Harney counties.

The purpose of this "staggers" term membership on local budget committees was declared to be that of making certain that some citizens who take part in budget preparation shall have had previous experience in determining how much tax money should be sent for cost of local government.

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Cooperative Has Stock Dispersal

A meeting of Tualatin Valley cooperative membership was held at Hillsboro union high school auditorium last Wednesday night.

Approximately \$40,000 in stock was distributed to the co-op's stockholders, according to R. N. Baker, plant manager.
