

Warning Issued On Hazards of Flying Kites

Advent of the kite flying season makes a warning of the hazards involved in flying kites close to power lines timely, believes Ralph H. Easler, Tualatin valley division manager of Portland General Electric company. He issued the following advice designed to prevent interruptions to electric power service and possible injury to kite flyers.

"Avoid flying a kite in the vicinity of telephone or power lines, and if it does become entangled in the wires, call the power company to have it removed, rather than attempting to remove it yourself.

"Design your kite so that it will fly without a tail, since it is the tail which usually becomes tangled.

"Never use wire, tinzel or other material for a kite string that will conduct electricity, and beware of
