



Hillsboro High Gal Basketeers Win 5, Lose 0

Hilli's girl basketball players, coached by Alice Fish, recently wound up an unbeaten season with five victories and no losses, piling up 133 points to only 79 for opponents.

The Spartans girls defeated Beaverton, McMinnville, Newberg, and Jefferson high of Portland, twice, trimming their Washington county rivals by scores of 40 to 11 and 35 to 25. In their wind-up game of the season the Hilli girls had to come from behind to beat the Devil Demos from Jeff high, trailing by 7 to 4 at the end of the first half after a jittery start.

Counting an extra first half against McMinnville which Hilli won by 10 to 8, Lucy Mann led the team scoring with 37 points. Betty Wambaugh was second with 30 tallies and Charlene Helgeson a close third with 28 Others: Ruth Heister 22, Gladys Burkhalter 21, Nourine Schultz 18, Dorothea Edwards 6, Betty Weathers 2. Some of the girls played both forward and guard positions at various times. Guards do not score in girls' basketball since they are confined to the defensive half of the court.

Hilli's comeback in the state basketball tournament to whip Salem, Bend, and Astoria in succession for consolation honors after losing to Eugene in the first round was just another case where Coach Don Kirsch's Spartans proved they could pull themselves from the doldrums of a bad licking in short order.

The mauling 47-to-27 Hilli took from Eugene on Wednesday was most top-sided game of the first round and left the railbirds rather unimpressed. The loss was the second occasion on four state tournament trips that Hilli lost in the first round to a team that later won the championship. The other occasion being in 1926-1927 when a Spartan quintet ever rated the big show—when Salem beat B. M. (Goody) Goodman's team, 45 to 23.

Hilli's comeback in the state basketball tournament to whip Salem, Bend, and Astoria in succession for consolation honors after losing to Eugene in the first round was just another case where Coach Don Kirsch's Spartans proved they could pull themselves from the doldrums of a bad licking in short order.

But getting back to the way the Kirschmen picked themselves from flat on their backs to hit high gear, Hilli took several pretty solid thrashings during the season and came back every time in nice style. Prime example was in December when Astoria came here and won, 40-to-27. Hilli avenged that one six days later in the Fishermen's gym, 31 to 27.

Late in the season, Oregon City trimmed the boys, 69 to 31. After Hilli downed easy Tigard, 49 to 34, West Linn came to Hillsboro to beat 'em, 39 to 27. Knock Hilli out of a first-place tie in the TVV league. The Spartans came back from that to coast to a 35-to-23 win over Tugard in the first round of the district tourney and then down Beaverton in the final game, 38 to 25 in impressive style—the Beavers being a club Hilli barely beat by 23 to 27 and 27 to 25 on previous occasions.

Coach Don Kirsch's crew had a season's record of 23 wins and only seven losses, which is a 766 winning percentage. The five other teams were able to beat Hilli without having the Spartans win a return game. The University of Oregon coach and Eugene, Duane Olanie defeats were to Astoria, McMinnville, Oregon City, Molalla, and West Linn—quintets Hilli was able to defeat during the season.

Hilli's free rooting played no small part in a couple of wins, the locals collecting 18 out of 25 against Salem and 18 out of 23 against Astoria... Les Clark, Spartan forward, got some votes for all-state second team... the local VFW is planning to again sponsor the Washington county independent hoop tourney next year after a successful start in last week's affair here.

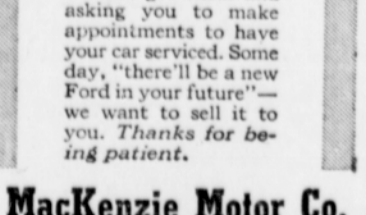

Amacher Tops Spartan Scoring With 290 Points

Bob Amacher, Hilli's star center, collected a total of 290 points during the season for an average of almost 10 points per game for the Spartans' 30 games. The high-scoring pivotman rolled in 120 field goals and potted 50 free throws to amass the huge total.

Guard Dave Frank wound up in second place on the team scoring with 210 points, an edge of four tallies over Forward Les Clark, who rallied at the finish to score 38 points in the last three state tournament games. Frank collected 72 field goals and 66 free throws, leading in the gift toss department. Clark was second on free throws with 54 and second on the squad on field goals with 76.

Two other Spartan hoopers were above the 100-point mark on season scoring. Guard Willie Laird posted 136 tallies on 55 field goals and 26 free throws, and Forward Forrest Henning collected 107 points on 39 field goals and 29 free throws. Amacher and Clark wound up with the most personal fruits at 67 apiece. Laird was a close third with 66.

Hilli Center on All-State Second

Bob Amacher, Hilli's elongated center, was given a second berth on the all-state hoop squad announced Saturday night at Salem at the conclusion of the 27th annual state prep tournament. Four officials and 16 coaches were guiding hands in the selection.
