Forest Grove Cafe Quintet Wins County Independent Hoop Crown

A relentless-driving crew of Forest Grove Cafe hoopers defeated Hillsboro's Imperial Feed quintet, 73 to 57, on the Hills floor Saturday night to win the first annual Washington county independent basketball tournament.

The high-scoring triumph of the Forest Grove veterans climaxed a three-day tourney which opened with eight teams under sponsorship of the local Veterans of Foreign Wars post No. 2686, assisted by Imperial Feed. Ford Kenney on behalf of the FW at the conclusion of the final game presented the championship trophy to the Forest Grove Cafe quintet and the team sportsmanship trophy to Gaston.

The Forest Grove quintet jumped to a first quarter lead of 16 to 7 over Imperial Feed but saw that melt away to only one point at 20 to 19 at half-time. The visiting quintet hit its stride in the third period, however piling up 24 points while the Feedmen managed adding only three. Forest Grove continued to roll in the final period, posting 32 more points to 13 for Imperial.

The Forest Grove quintet moved to the finals by virtue of a 46-30 triumph over the Beaverton Pharmacy Seniors on Friday night while Imperial Feed was edging out a tough Tualatin team, 29 to 27. Jim Woods tossed two free throws near the finish to break a 27-to-27 deadlock and give the Feedmen their triumph. Forest Grove held only a 21-to-19 lead over Beaverton at half but was out in front by 42 to 27 at the three-quarter mark.

In the first round, Imperial Feed eliminated its Hillsboro rival, Tualatin Valley Co-op—manned by the Francis brothers—by a score of 40 to 38. Forest Grove Cafe opened with a 28-to-14 win over the Beaverton Pharmacy Juniors, coming from behind in the final quarter to overcome a 13-to-10 deficit.

Tualatin overpowered the Gaston Townies by a score of 49 to 17 and Beaverton Pharmacy Seniors de-

Hillsboro Riflers Triumph Again In C-W League

Hillsboro Rifle & Pistol club, first team, again made a sweep of Columbia-Willamette league handgun matches Friday night. No. 1 team defeating Gaston by 84 to 80, and No. 2 winning over Vancouver 806 to 943. Both matches were on the home range.
