

U. S. Will Back Iran Before U. N. O. Council

The United States will give Iran the complete support for her case against the Soviet Union at the United Nations security council, it was learned in Washington Wednesday. Russians likely to cloud issue, State Faith in UNO.

Secretary of State Byrnes rejected Saturday night any idea of an alliance with Russia against Britain or Britain against Russia. He declared the United States bases its hopes for security on the United Nations Organization "as the path to enduring peace."

Back Iran Oil Policy
Great Britain and the United States were reported Monday to be opposed in any negotiations between Iran and Russia on oil concessions while Soviet troops remain on Iranian soil.

Cablegrams from Tehran to the United Nations security council of its territory.

Winston Churchill in New York

Friday said the United Nations must rule on Russia's act.

Russia Makes Charges
Russia charges the U. S. with removing Japanese and German property from Japan to the United States. The charge was denied flatly by Gen. MacArthur.

Plot Laid to U. S.
The Spanish government Monday charged that the U. S. engaged in espionage activities in Spain in North Africa in 1943, and early the following year admitted a plan to other allied nations for an invasion of the Iberian peninsula.

Millions Gassed
The gassing of two million Jews and other persons at the Auschwitz camp has been admitted in a signed statement given to British authorities by Rudolf Hoess, 46-year-old commandant of the camp, from Heinrich Himmler.

Powerful Fleet Held Needed
Adm. Nimitz told congress Tuesday that the U. S. should have a powerful fleet in the postwar world and disclosed that it is so weak now that it would take at least six months to prepare it for an emergency.

Want Draft Extended
Selective service appealed Tuesday for extension of the draft indefinitely and spurred along a congressional drive for action.

Give Right to Freedom
British Prime Minister Attlee declared Friday that India "has the right" to choose full independence, and that if she elects to remain within the British commonwealth "she must be given free will."

Senator Morse Complains
Senator Wayne Morse of Oregon complained Monday that the nation is "going to hell" for lack of positive action to solve the lumber shortage.

26 Killed in Air Wreck
Twenty-six army and navy men were killed Tuesday in a C-47 transport plane which strayed over a wide area of the crash scene near Lake Tahoe in California. Later, the wreckage of a B-29 bomber was sighted near Livermore, Cal.

SHANGHAI, CHINA—When Lt. Gen. A. C. Wedemeyer sent his personal jeep to the 173rd mobile quartermaster battalion garage for a periodic check-up, T. E. Hien, a Walker of Hillsboro and his colleagues decided to surprise the commanding general of the United States in China.

Picking up salvage items and various odds and ends, they transformed the vehicle into a super-jeep. In addition to putting in leather seats, repainting the body, adding white side-walls to the fenders, the quartermaster crew put chrome finish bumpers and added chrome trimming the hood. An old bulb horn, typical of the model T, was attached. A special light, showing the general's three stars, was placed on the fenders.

OSC Flying Course Attracts Students

THREE hundred students, 22 of them coeds, have signed up for the flight training course offered for the first time spring term starting April 1. General engineering credit is given for the work which includes ground school classes on the campus with flying conducted from the Corvallis airport four miles to the south.

Though largely self supporting through a special term fee of \$80, the flight training work quickly drew applicants to the capacity of the firm that has contracted to give the air work. The Smith-Livingston Air service, one of the oldest in the state, will employ 15 light instructors, and will have 15 Piper Cubs, six Ryans for restricted aerobatics, a few Vultee BT 13 instrument trainers, and one twin-engine Cessna.

The special fee of \$80 covers cost of flight training, transportation to and from the field, and insurance. Extra low insurance rates have been granted because of the excellent safety record made by the firm in 160,000 hours of flight instruction.
