

Budget Set for Construction of Workers' Camp

Board of directors of the Washington County Farm Labor association at its meeting in Hillsboro Tuesday voted to proceed on a budget of \$20,000 for establishment of the planned migratory workers' farm labor camp. Site of the camp from the board of directors were probably bid have to be assigned back to the board of directors before plans for the workers' camp can be carried forward. Four thousand dollars in federal funds is being made available for the project through the state farm labor extension service. The remainder must come locally.

Secretary Named At Aid Meeting

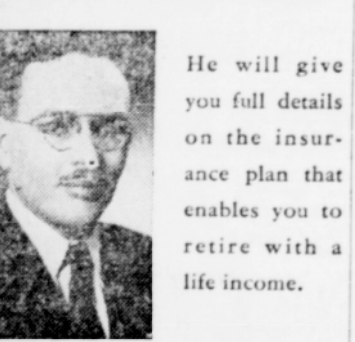

(Continued from page 1) probably be around a million and a half. In the current year, the present total of \$8.1 per cent of all current taxes have been collected. Approximately 15,600 tax receipts have been issued. Sheriff Connell cited the importance of changing present tax laws to require governmental subdivisions to report their millages not later than June 15 to the assessor so that he may have an opportunity to build his tax roll and set it over to the sheriff to make out all the tax receipts in advance of collection. He said the tax deputies have all the segregations to change on the books and transfers of property from the first of the year on through the tax collecting, transfer to the new books the delinquencies and make out the tax receipts.

"When we get the tax roll on about the 15th of October, we have all this work to do and collect about 80 per cent of the taxes before November 6 each year," Sheriff Connell said. "Nobody can handle that volume of business efficiently in that short length of time." Colonel Joseph K. Carson, former mayor of Portland, will be the speaker next Tuesday, W. G.
