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Gaston Resident Over 50 Years Buried Tuesday

Berthold Fleischhauer, a resident of Gaston vicinity for over 50 years, died Friday morning at the Good Samaritan hospital in Portland, where he had been moved Tuesday evening suffering from heart trouble and dropsy complications. Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon from the Forest Grove Undertaking parlors with interment at Hill cemetery, Gaston.

Berthold Fleischhauer was born in Eischenbergen, Germany, February 11, 1866, and came to America at the age of 17 and located at Millersburg, where he worked at his trade of paperhanger and painter. Three years later he moved to Portland and continued to work at his trade and was married in 1902 to Miss Anna Zimmerly. In 1902 the family came to Gaston where he bought a farm in Patton valley. His wife died in 1902 leaving four small children, Fred, Hilda, Walter and Sam. One year later Mr. Fleischhauer was united in marriage to Marie Hartke Redinger, who survives him, as well as the one child born of this marriage, Mrs. Alice McManan. Two sons died in early manhood, Walter, killed in France, and Fred who died in Gaston. Mrs. Hilda Herr and Sam Fleischhauer as well as eight grandchildren and eight great grandchildren survive, as also one step-son, A. G. Reider.

Mr. Fleischhauer was a member of the Knights of Pythias lodge and I.O.O.F. lodge of Gaston and a trustee of both orders. He had served Gaston as mayor, was a member of the school board for over 20 years and one of the city councilmen. The Knights of Pythias lodge had charge of the grave-digging services. Rev. Carl King, John Beger, A. C. Ahlgren, Fred Koberstein and Bob Gibson served as pallbearers.

PGE Substation Enlarged Here

Increased use of electric service in the Hillsboro area has made necessary the installation of larger transformer and voltage regulator equipment which has enlarged the capacity of the Hillsboro substation five times, according to Ralph R. Easter, Tualatin valley division manager for Portland General Electric company.

Just completed, the new installation represents an increased value in distribution facilities for Hillsboro of \$65,000, Easter stated. The new transformer has a capacity of 1000 kva and replaced a 300 kva transformer formerly used. A new three-phase voltage regulator was installed as part of the improvement and represented approximately half the total cost of the job.

Fryers Readied For Resort Trade

BANKS—E. O. Oman and Sons, who started in the poultry business here last spring after purchasing Parmley hall, have between 5000 and 6000 fryers in the freezer for use in the restaurant the Snack Shop, which they recently bought at Seaside.

Oman and Sons first raised 5000 young turkeys and when these were old enough to go range began raising fryers. The chickens, which are 10 to 12 weeks old, are picked with a picking machine and cut in half after being thoroughly cleaned. The necks, tails and wing tips are packed separately and sold to hospitals for soup. The hearts and gizzards are packed together and the livers separately.
