Truman Urges Americans Eat Less As Help

President Truman said Wednesday that most Americans eat too much and that it might be a good idea if their food consumption were reduced to low European standards for two days a week during the world crisis. He also said that Americans waste enough food to prevent people in war-ravaged areas from starving.

Airplane's Use In Fire Control Told by Forester

Aerial fire control work by the forest service was discussed at the chamber of commerce Tuesday by L. L. Colville of Portland, assistant regional forester. He was introduced by Judge H. D. Kerkman.

Colville said it looked like a bright future ahead for aerial fire control as a result of the improvements in the way of retardants and bomb sights that have come about during the war. He expressed the belief that the fire control offers possibilities. With the co-operation of the military, an extensive trial will be given to fire control by air this summer.

The forest service is being asked constantly why fire cannot be fought by bombing, according to Colville, who said that a good trial was given prior to the war, but that it did not prove satisfactory because of the retardants and bomb sights then in use.

Aerial fire control, according to Colville, has only been used when it is impossible to get in to the fire with trucks. It is used in detection, transfer of supplies and equipment, transfer of personnel and for bombing fires. Six hundred men have been trained for jumping stry bullets and have been 25 accidents in 500 jumps. The plane has been most useful following lightning storms and is used a great deal in scouting large fires with pictures being developed in the air and given to the fire chief in 18 minutes.

"No fire control," he said, "is better than prevention."

Happy Hour club meets Thursday at the home of Florence Garrison, with Nellie Chapman as hostess.

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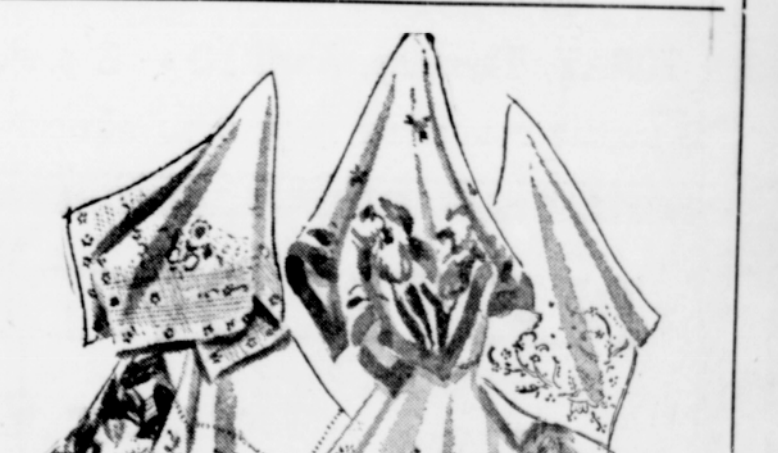
