BANKS—Ed Moore, secretary of the Hillsboro chamber of commerce, spoke before the newly organized Sunset chamber of commerce at a meeting held in the R.N.A. hall at Banks Tuesday evening. TIME was when housewives just took the foods that were available at the season, cooked them and served them to their families. Vitamins were unknown, no one had heard of balanced meals. They did not have the variety of fresh vegetables that we now get from far away and in frozen form.

Some summer vegetables were canned and made into various relishes, but those that could be stored in cellars and root cellars were what was mostly consumed in winter. More meat was eaten.

We are healthier now, we hope, and we live longer and food means more to us now than just something to fill us up and to taste good. We eat it with its healthful qualities in mind as well as its deliciousness, as in the following menu: If you are cheering a meatless Lent, serve fish instead of meat for dinner.

Sift milk, cool to lukewarm.

Crumble yeast into mixing bowl,

add milk, sugar or molasses and

salt, mix well. Sift white flour,

measure and stir into mixture;

add softened shortening, working

in well; add whole wheat flour

(do not sift), turn dough in bowl,

cover; let rise to double in bulk.

Knead a short time, cut into

rolls, let rise again and bake in

hot oven (450 deg. F.) 15 min.,

reduce heat to 375 deg. F. for 20

to 30 mins. longer. Or you may

make 1 small loaf and 1 pan roll.

Prune Ice Cream

1 c. prune pulp 1/2 tsp. salt

1/2 c. sugar 1/2 c. milk

Juice of 1 lemon 1 c. heavy

Juice 1 orange cream

Rub cooked prunes through

sieve; add remaining ingredients,

whip cream last. Mix thoroughly and freeze. Serves 6.
