more money for larger sizes, which accounts for the shortage of men's and women's merchandise such as dresses, shirts, etc." He said the older manufacturers have been hardest hit and pointed out that new ones have been allowed to start producing a new inferior line and charge a much higher price for it and make bigger profit.

The following is a charge brought by a store owner: "The OPA employs think they are a race above the laws and nounce on innocent hard-working merchants like the German Gestapo. We good Americans aren't used to such treatment."

A merchant produced a little document he was saving. It said: "The sum total of squeeze on business . . . plus black market inflation . . . plus bottleneck in distribution . . . plus incompetence and confusion . . . equals OPA."

A county meat man said: "In the meat game the quicker they get back to regular supply and demand the better off we'll be."

He explained that he believe some price control is good. We don't want runaway inflation. There's plenty of meat in the country, he maintained, "all they have to do is make it profitable for the farmers to raise it."

He concluded "As soon as they get production the law of supply and demand will take care of it."

A grocer said "I think OPA the way it was originally intended as to whether it was intended to be straightened out in a satisfactory manner. I really believe that with so much black marketing it should be dropped. People in black marketing are fighting to keep it going."

A Hillsboro merchant complained: "They jump onto the little fellows and fine them with no regard to what they are doing. It's intentional or not. There's lots of it."

When told by the Argus reporter that no names would be mentioned in print, every one of the merchants took advantage of the opportunity given him to speak for or against OPA and price controls.
