GI Bill of Rights Benefits Explained

Benefits of the GI bill of rights, including a college education, are open to every qualified young man who enlists in the regular army before October 6, 1946, according to a release from the military personnel procurement service in Portland.

Enlistments are open to men aged 17 to 34, and may be for one and a half, two or three years. After a three-year enlistment the discharges can have 48 months of education at the college or university, business or trade school, he selects. The government will pay his tuition, up to \$500 per ordinary school year plus a \$65 monthly allowance for living expenses—\$90 if he is married.

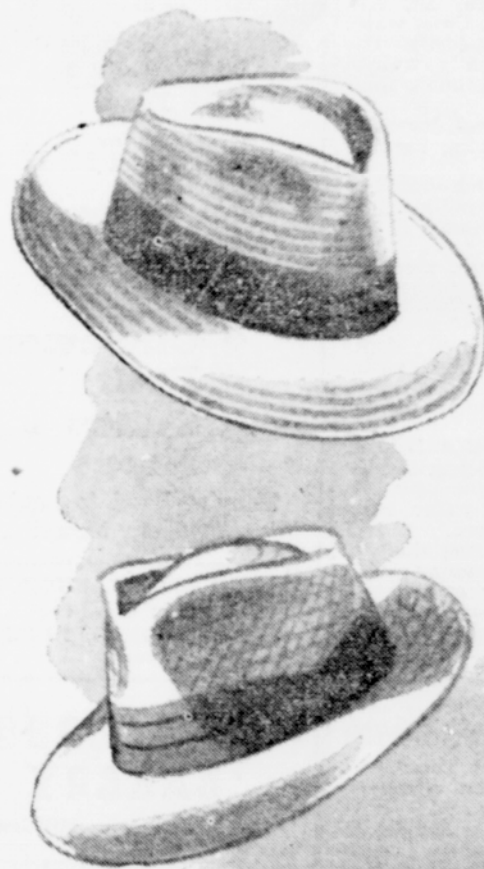
