

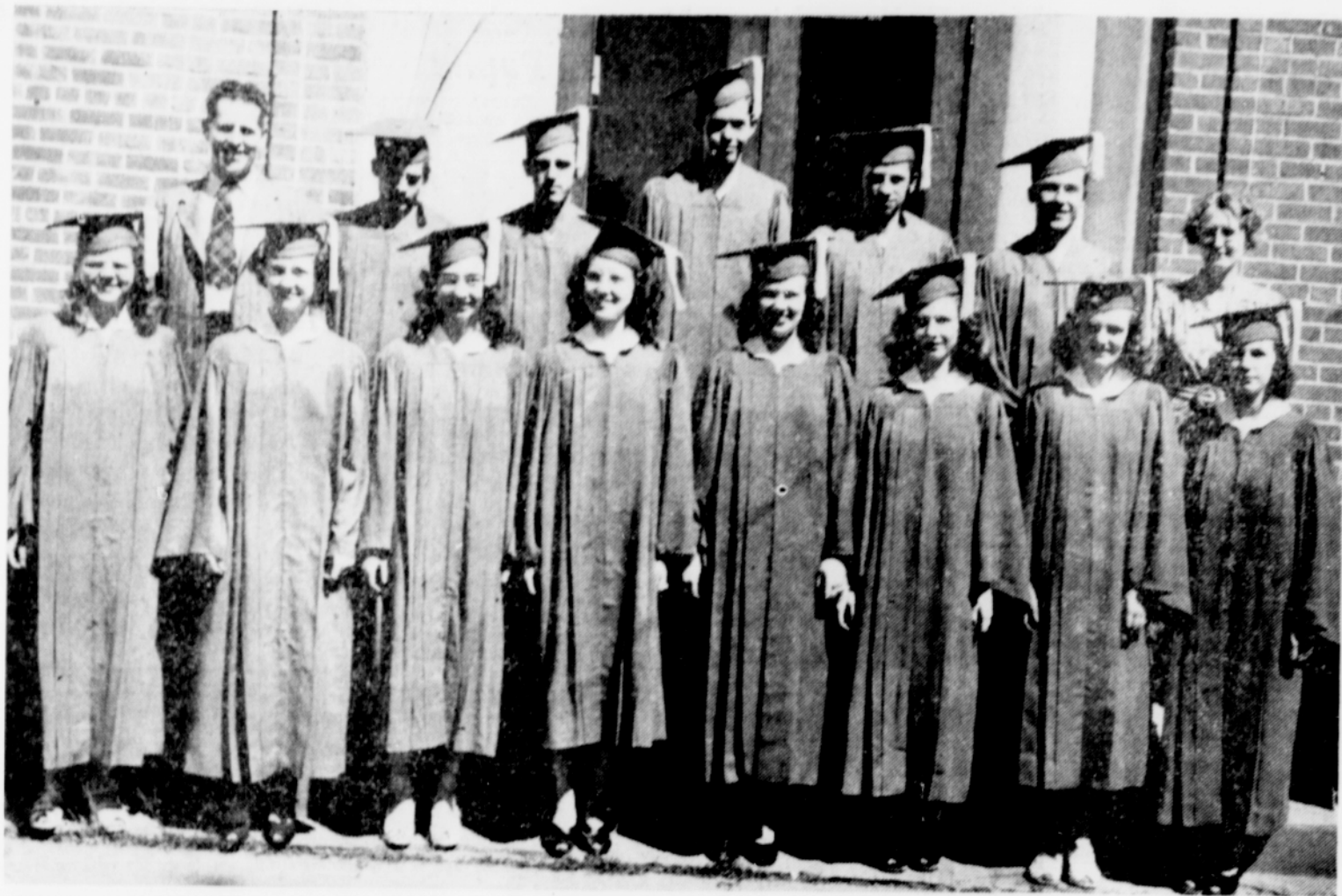
Commencement At Forest Grove High Friday Eve
