The citation reads: "For his exceptional service to the construction service, Central Pacific Base Command, in the expeditionary man-

agement of underground construction work and dredging operations. His foresight, resourcefulness and untiring efforts resulted in the availability of coral fill material for air strips, thereby contributing immeasurably to the successful prosecution of the war."

Strandberg was construction superintendent of government harbor improvement on Midway island before the war started. He is a graduate of Oregon State college.

Railroad Strike Causes Little Grief Locally

Hillsboro apparently suffered little from the railroad strike which ended Saturday afternoon in comparison with some parts of the country. H. D. Olsen, agent for Southern Pacific and Leonard Sherman, agent for Oregon Electric, both said the strike occurred during a between-the-season lull in shipment of perishables.

The local post office quit accepting parcels during the strike, according to Postmaster L. T. McPherson. Outgoing first class mail dropped off but was back to normal early this week. The post office ships out some nursery stock, and day-old chicks for 48 hour delivery, and these had to be refused until the strike was over.

Southern Pacific sends 14 freight trains a day through Hillsboro between Portland and points beyond McMinnville and Timber and these were stopped until Saturday evening. Oregon Electric sends one train a day from Portland and this schedule was resumed early Tuesday morning, according to Sherman.

A car owned by C. K. Goodrich of route 1, Banks, which was stolen on the night of May 23, was later recovered by police at Seaside where a 19-year-old San Francisco boy was arrested May 28. The youth was held by police in Astoria for the county sheriff's office and is now at the county jail in Hillsboro with bail set at \$1000.

Strawberry picking began about a week ago in a few Washington county fields where light picking of commercial berries took place. In general, picking is expected to start about Friday, May 31, in practically all except mountain fields. Most strawberry growers report excellent crop prospects which are being helped along by the recent rain and cool weather.
