

Mrs. Fischer Honored As Camp Fire Leader

At a dinner honoring Camp Fire leaders last Wednesday night at the Masonic temple, Mrs. George Fischer, who has served 19 years as a Camp Fire leader, was specially honored by being presented with a bronze plaque to be hung over the rock fireplace in the lodge at Camp Adahi, giving the building her own name. The plaque, which was presented by Mrs. R. R. Easter, president of the Hillsboro Camp Fire council, bore the inscription:

"Anna Fischer Lodge. In tribute to Anna Fischer, whose untiring efforts and devotion to Camp Fire will remain forever an inspiration to those coming under its influence, May 22, 1948."

Mrs. Easter in presenting the plaque stated that the first group of Camp Fire girls in Hillsboro was organized in 1929 by Mrs. W. C. Thea (now of Tacoma) with Miss Alice Noster as guardian. Among the girls in this group were Mrs. Thea's daughter, Dolores, now Mrs. C. Epps; Louise Frank and Margaret Johnson.

Excerpts from her speech follow: "Two years before Camp Fire was organized in Hillsboro, in 1927, Anna Fischer started her work in Portland. In 1931 Mrs. Fischer moved to Hillsboro, but continued with her Portland group until 1933, when she organized a group in Hillsboro. Since that time she has served continuously as a leader as well as chairman of the guardians and president of the council many times."

"However, being a guardian was only one phase of Anna Fischer's work," continued Mrs. Easter. "When the demand for a camp made it necessary to establish one,

she helped select the site and Camp Adahi opened in 1938. To Camp Fire workers, the words Camp Adahi and Anna Fischer are practically synonymous. It was she who was ever ready to help in all phases of the work at camp year and year out. The board feels now that the success of the camp is due to her judgment and management."

"Each cabin at camp has a name, but the main building is just called the lodge. So, tonight, the board desires to state that in the future, as an expression of love and appreciation this building will be known as the 'Anna Fischer Lodge.'"

Miss Blanche Britton, Horizon club advisor, who has been Camp Fire leader for 10 years was presented with a lovely gift and certificate. Miss Marjorie Dibble, executive secretary of the Columbia area, on making the award, said when she became interested in Camp Fire she did not have a leader for five years—and now, however, she would have been to have had one like Miss Britton. Others receiving awards and corsages were Mrs. Paul Patterson, guardian for six years; Mrs. Lester Hewitt, four years; Mrs. A. L. Schulmerich, two years; Mrs. A. L. Schulmerich, one year; and Mrs. J. B. Burns, Blue Bird leader for two years.

Mrs. A. B. Drew, field secretary of Washington county, presented corsages to leaders in the first year—Camp Fire: Mesdames Walter Freeman, M. L. Strommer, Lawrence Hunt, and Harold Meyer. Blue Bird: Mesdames J. B. Thomas, Kenneth McGrath, Ed Ball, and Don Marley.

A. C. McKicken, the speaker, stated that the Columbia Camp Fire area, which includes Hillsboro, is the largest in the world, having practically 5,000 girls in the area. Mr. McKicken has been in Camp Fire work many years and has been on the Portland council for 15 years.

Paul Patterson presided at the meeting.
