Nut Growers Protest Food-Relief Policies

North Pacific Nut Growers Cooperative of Dundee and the Oregon Nut Growers, Inc. have endorsed a joint resolution of major farm organizations representing American almond, walnut, filbert, and pecan producers dispatched to Washington protesting food-relief policies of the United States and UNRRA.

The resolution offered by the nut producers asks that the United States instruct its representatives on UNRRA to insist that food stuffs produced in the famine areas be used in those areas and that European exporters not be permitted to make shipments of food to the United States as long as those countries are receiving free foodstuffs from America.

Letters have been forwarded to President Harry S. Truman and to Fiorella LaGuardia, director-general of UNRRA, protesting the food-relief policies. It is charged that unprecedented tonnages of edible nuts are now being dumped on the American market by the

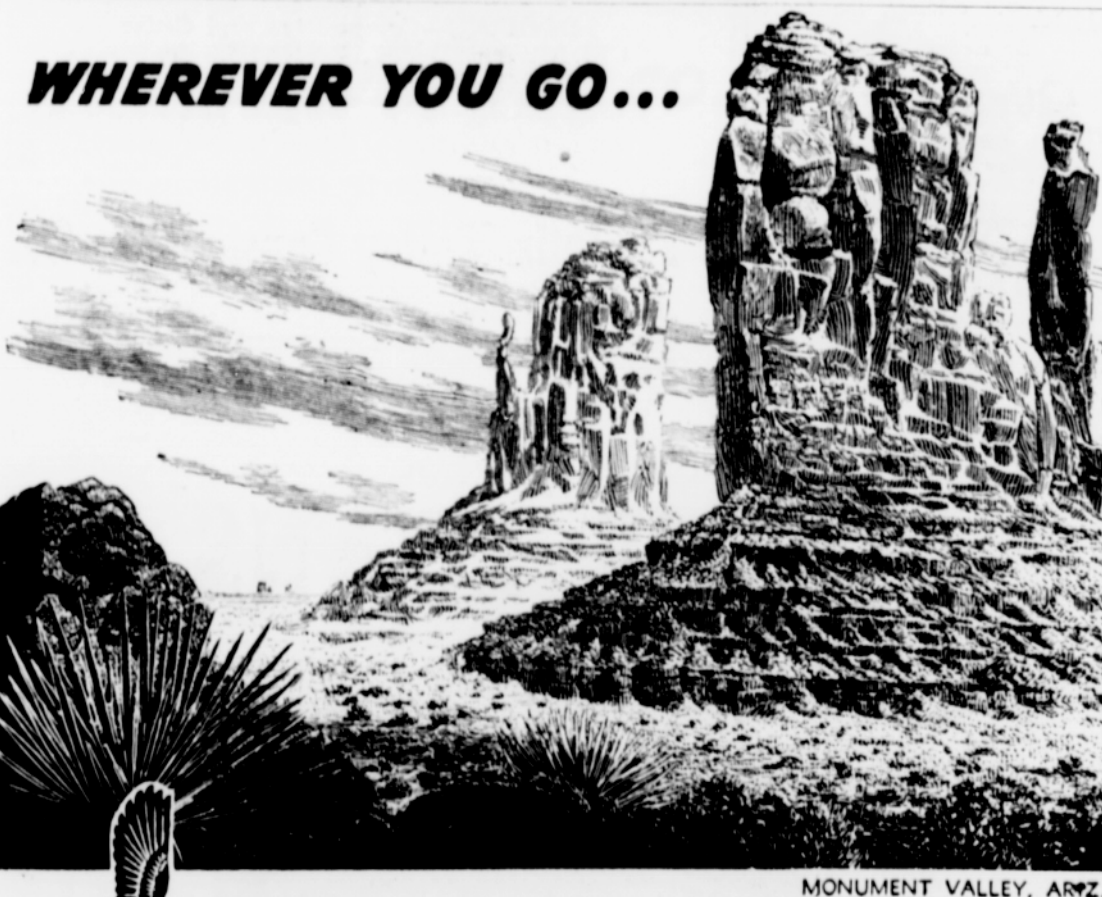
