Mrs. George Knauff and little daughter Donna arrived in Honolulu Wednesday, May 29, aboard the Matsonia, according to word received by Mrs. Knauff's parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Stannard. Mr. Knauff, U. S. Navy, has been at Pearl Harbor for some time, and his family joined him there.

SS Matsonia, the first commercial passenger ship to leave any American port since December 7, 1941, arrived there with 573 passengers on board, and was the inspiration for a grand celebration on the island. Dignitaries of the city and the Royal Hawaiian band, hula dancers and Hawaiian rhythms were on hand at 7:30 a. m. to welcome the ship and a giant hula lei of welcome adorned the Matsonia as she rode into port.

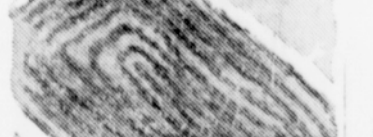

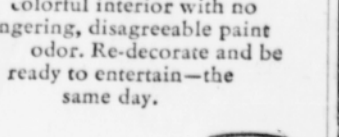
