Why "Search" For Health?

Not so long ago people used to travel for and wide "in search of health." This was particularly true if they had tuberculosis. They thought their only hope lay in a change of climate.

Today we know that a high, dry climate is not essential to recovery from tuberculosis. The most important thing for the tuberculosis patient is to obtain complete bed rest. The best place to obtain this complete rest is in a tuberculosis hospital.

A tuberculosis hospital near the patient's home is as good—often better—than one at a distance, regardless of the climate.

No climate will of itself "cure" tuberculosis. Treatment for tuberculosis can be undertaken in any climate. The chances of arresting the disease and restoring the patient to normal living are best when treatment is begun early. Instead of searching for a "magic" climate, the tuberculosis patient will save valuable time, and also money, by placing himself under competent medical care near his own home.

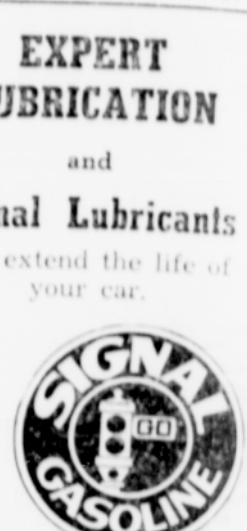
