TYV League Officials Elect Officers, Discuss Next Year's Slates at Confab

Enlarging the baseball schedule, adding wrestling to the docket, changing the team slate, discussion of the football jamboree and election of officers featured a meeting of Tualatin-Yamhill valley league officials at Nendels restaurant near Beaverton last week.

Cliff Skinner, new principal of McMinnville high school, was elected president of the league for the coming year, succeeding Robert Henning, West Linn superintendent. Paul A. Monson, Forest Grove principal, was elected vice-president, and Harold W. Sorkin of Newberg was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

A break from the traditional Tuesday-Friday basketball schedule will be made next winter since a majority of the schools favor changing to a Friday-Saturday schedule. Rotation of the games will remain the same as in the past on the new schedule with the home contests reversed from last year. The schedule will be made out on a Tuesday-Friday basis with a left optional as to the switch to week-end series. Hillsboro, Tillamook, Forest Grove, Beaverton and West Linn went on record as definitely favoring the Friday-Saturday schedule.

The TYV officials voted to have a double round-robin schedule for baseball with teams meeting on a home-and-home basis rather than

the abbreviated schedule of last year which called for only five games. Starting time on games was moved back an hour to 3:30 p. m. in order to not conflict with classes. Starting of track meets was also delayed for the same reason.

General plans for the first football jamboree since 1941 were discussed. The event will be held at Hillsboro September 20, with John R. Cox, principal of Hillsboro, in charge of the event. The drawing will be held at Hillsboro and will call for a series of four 15-minute games. All hands are to be present with the Hills unit designated official band for the occasion.

Price for adults at the grid games was upped from 50 cents to 75 cents. The 35 cent price for children will remain the same.

Wrestling will be added to the TYV league itinerary next winter for schools interested. The sport will follow state association rules on weight entries.
