Dr. Skipworth, who retired 15 years ago, served for more than 50 years as a Methodist minister and was the last survivor of the original incorporators of the Oregon Methodist conference.

Dr. Skipworth was born in Union parish, Louisiana, December 23, 1862, the son of Dr. N. M. and Cora Skipworth. When he was 12 he came with his parents to Portland on the old steamer Ajax. The father, early-day circuit rider and preacher, built the first church at Independence.

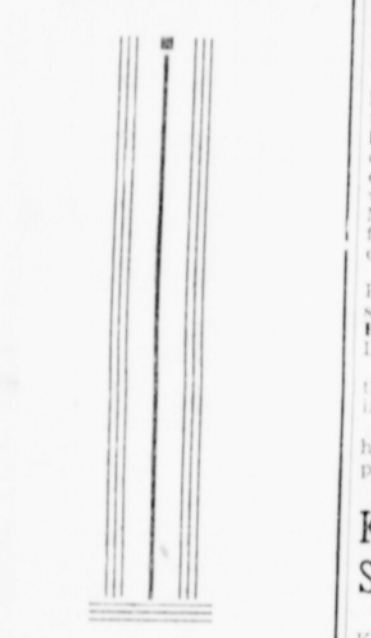

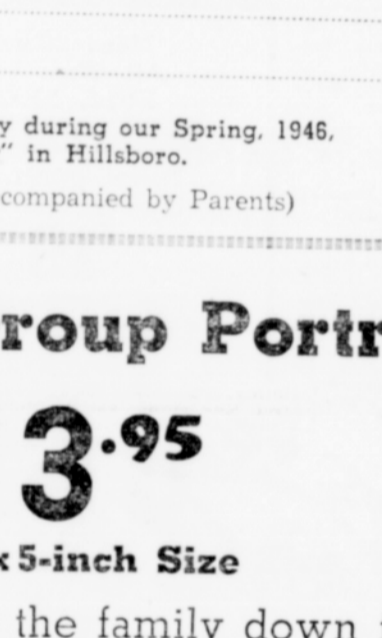

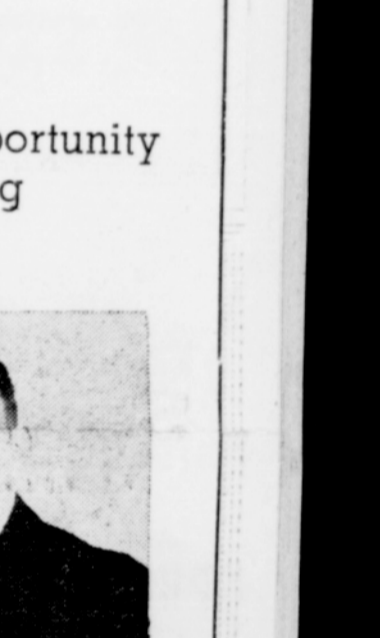
