Carol Drake tells how to conserve on bread

The Family Emergency Committee has asked Americans to cooperate during the present food emergency to conserve bread so that starving people in other lands may be fed. We offer in the following suggestions ways to save precious bread.

TO KEEP YOUR BREAD FRESH!—Open the wrapper at one end of the loaf only. Remove the heel, take out only the slices needed, replace the heel, and fold over waxed paper.

TO FRESHEN DRY BREAD!—If your bread becomes slightly dry, sprinkle the wrapper around the bread with water or put the bread in a paper sack and sprinkle. Place in a moderate oven (350° F.) for about 10 minutes or until bread is heated through. Serve immediately for a homemade-bread flavor.

WHEN YOU HAVE LEFTOVER BREAD!—Don't throw it away. Use it in one of the following ways to augment your regular bread supply.

Mollic Toast!—Use leftover sliced bread. Place on a baking sheet in a single layer and dry out in slow oven (350° F.) about 1 1/2 hours or until a tempting toasty brown. Store in an airtight container and use as needed. Use in place of bread for breakfast, lunch, dinner or as a snack.

Note: Slice leftover hard rolls and use in the same way.

Bread Crumbs!—Dry out but do not brown leftover bread, trimmings, crusts and heels in slow oven (350° F.) for about 15 minutes or use already dry bread. Then roll, crush or grind into fine crumbs. Store in airtight container and use as needed. Use crumbs for scalloped dishes, for coating food, in puddings, or substitute for half the flour in waffles, pancakes, muffin or other quick bread recipes.
