Directors elected were Mesdames Emma McKinney, Alice Connell and T. G. Bronelee.

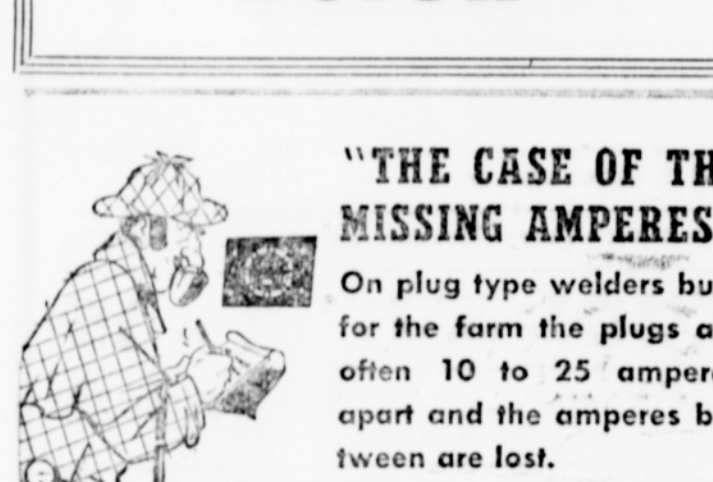

Royal Neighbors Meet in Moose Hall

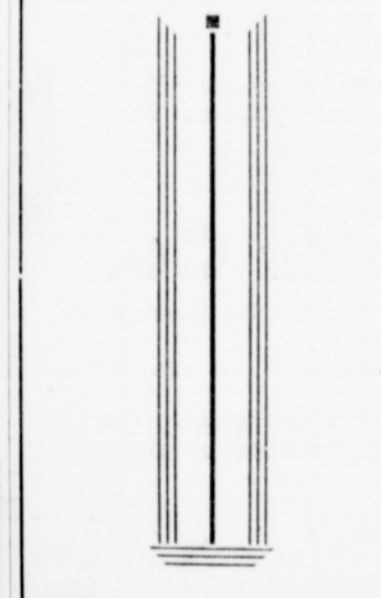
Royal Neighbors have moved from the Legion hall to the Moose hall and will hold the next meeting there Tuesday night at 8 o'clock.

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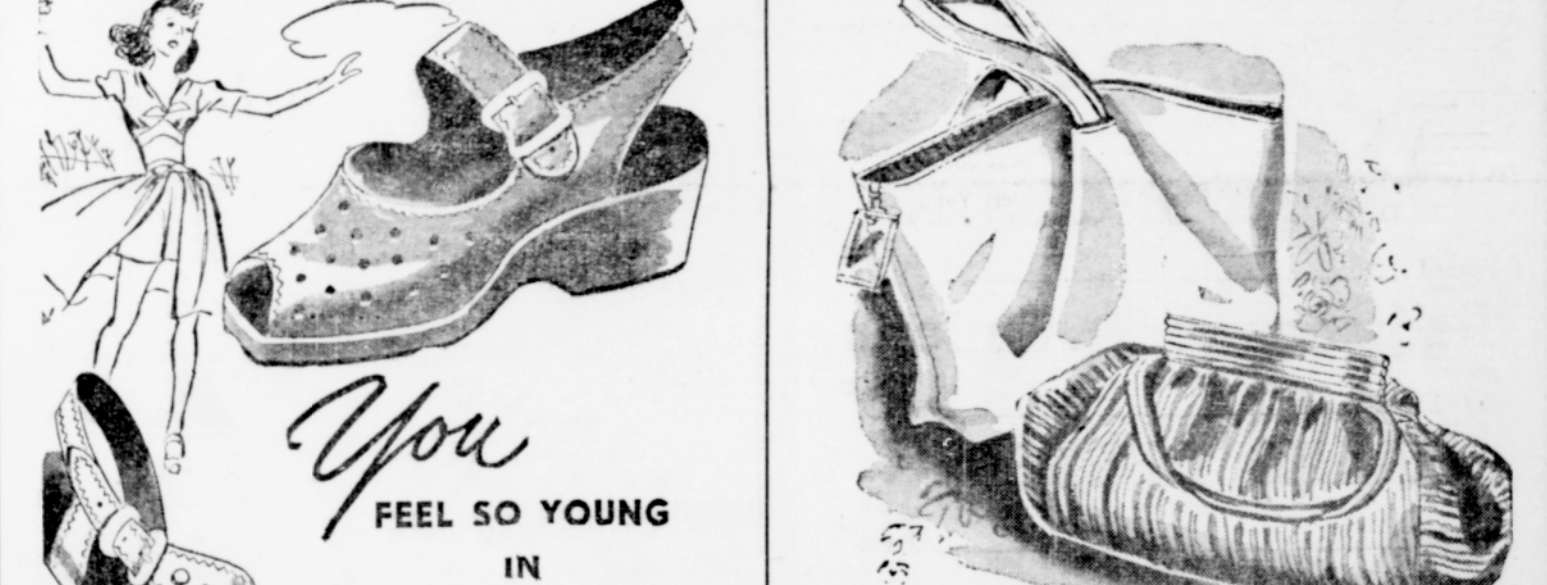
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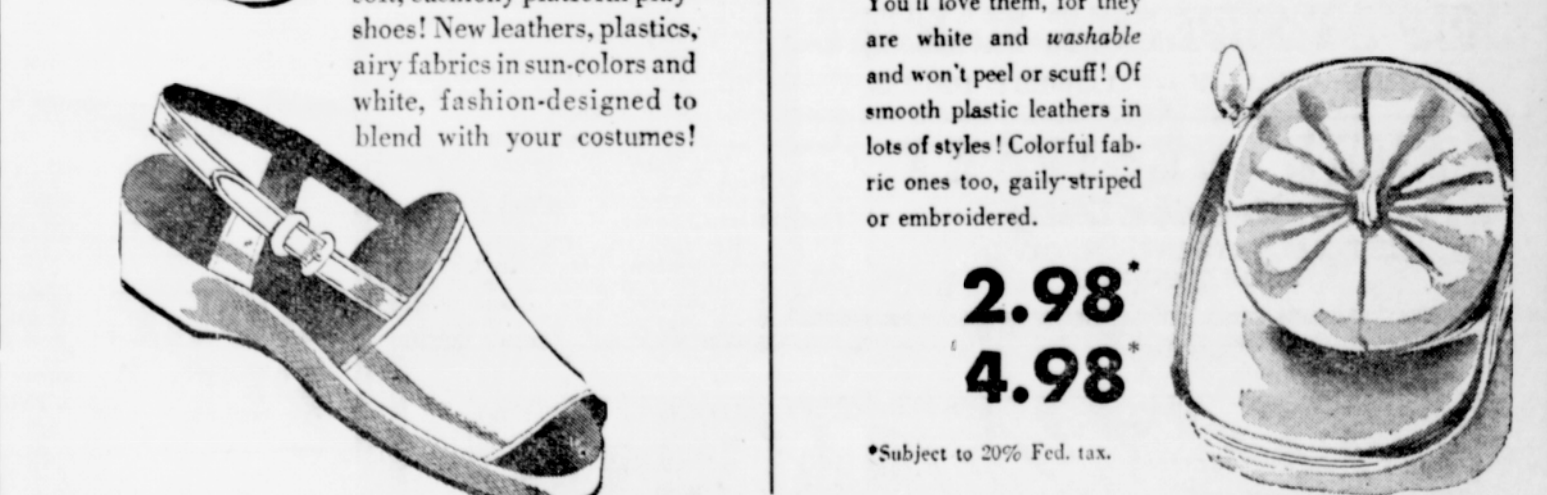
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
