Tommy Caldwell Writes of Alaska

Tom Caldwell, who is in Alaska with the Alcoa Mining company, sent home an interesting letter recently describing his surroundings. Excerpts include the following:

"When we arrived at the grassy, flower-covered edge of the lake, what did we see? We saw a spike-buck deer that was calmly eating his breakfast. He was continuing to eat and walking toward us until he was 20 feet of us. See bear or deer almost every day. Wolves are on the island but you only see signs left by them, which is quite frequent. There are 10 or 12 miles of logging road on the island and have seen where deer have been killed in the road by wolves. While we were eating this noon, three bald eagles soared in circles overhead at about 700 feet. Could see the white tail and head as they banked to the sun."

"There are lots of butter clams in or along the bay and tides are low now. Herb Christensen (Hillsboro boy) and I are going to try our luck in the morning. The last of this month the tide will be minus three and a half feet. We will catch lots of crabs in the bay. The salmon run starts around July 1. May catch some in the bay trolling."

"Heard KOIN (Portland) the other night. The announcer said 'Go to Hillsboro July 2-3-4.' Hal Hal!"
