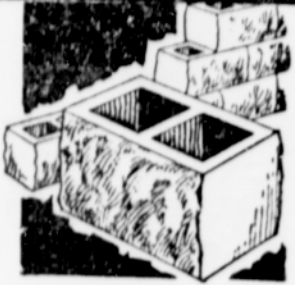

Executive Order Aids Hurt Veterans

James P. Cooley, director of the eleventh U. S. civil service region, announces that on June 4, 1946, the president of the United States issued an executive order providing that disabled veterans, wives of disabled veterans, or widows of veterans may file applications for promotional appointments for any position which may have been filled by a probational appointment within the preceding three years.

Such applicants who are entitled to a 10-point preference in federal examinations are given an opportunity in this manner to obtain permanent employment in the federal service.

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
