Camp Westwind Opening Today

Camp Westwind, the Y. W. C. A. sponsored camp for teen age girls near Otis, Ore., in Lincoln county, opens today (June 27) for the summer season.

Constance Impellaria of New York City is camp director. Mrs. J. L. Kovaly of Hillsboro is a member of the Y. W. C. A. camp committee.

Westwind will be open for four sessions this summer. The opening session continues until July 9. The second session runs from July 11 to July 23. The third session is July 25 to August 6, and the final period begins August 8 and ends August 20. Registration may be made at Camp Westwind headquarters, Y. W. C. A., 524 S. W. Broadway, Portland. A protective medical examination is required for all girls attending camp.

Camp Westwind capacity is limited to 72 girls each session. The safety of campers is insured by Red Cross aquatic instructors in all waterfront activities and a staff of trained counselors, one for every eight campers.

Located at the mouth of the Salmon river, Camp Westwind stretches one and a half miles along the Salmon river and two and a half miles along the Pacific ocean. Surf bathing, river swimming, boating, crafts, canoeing, archery and hiking are offered for campers.

The camp is open to employed girls for week-ends and vacations. Registration may be made with the Young Adult department of the Y. W. C. A.

Aid Available on Non-Service Hurts

Oregon veterans with disabilities incurred outside of service and thereby not coming within the scope of Veterans' Administration aid are reminded that they are entitled to assistance from the state division of vocational rehabilitation. It was pointed out this week by Department of Veterans Affairs officials.

This division of the state department of education provides medical diagnosis, physical restoration, if needed, vocational guidance, and vocational training to fit the needs of disabled persons. Supervisor Charles F. Feike explained.

He said that while set up to help all citizens of Oregon, the service is available as well to veterans whose disabilities are such that they are not entitled to aid under Public Law 16 for disabled veterans.

Division Agent Milton E. Cue said a veteran in Dayton, for example, had been in the army two months and was discharged due to aggravation of a previous injury. He received training from the state and is now working as a radio repairman.

Another veteran in McMinnville was discharged after 39 days of

service because of a back injury suffered in his high school football days. He has now applied for pre-rehabilitation office, not being eligible for this training from the veterans' administration.

By virtue of the state's program for the handicapped, it is possible for a veteran to get additional aid in completing his college education after using up his GI rights under Public Law 348. A case was cited at Oregon State college where a veteran, eligible for three years of GI schooling, will have his last year of training paid by the state because of a physical handicap which was not service-incurred.

Depending on the man's need, the state deers school costs, tuition, tools and training supplies. It was explained. Veterans seeking this help were advised to write the division of vocational rehabilitation, State Library building, Salem. An agent of the division will call later in their home communities.
