

## Norblad Protests Importation of European Nuts

Representative Walter Norblad of Astoria has protested to the state department in Washington, D. C. and UNRRA against "the grave injustice" suffered by the free nut industry of the United States due to the American government's permitting huge importations of edible nuts from famine-stricken areas of Europe instead of requiring their use and consumption in the European market.

Norblad suggested that the present condition could be remedied if UNRRA would demand that these importations be prohibited as a condition for the insurance of American food into these areas. He pointed out that during the last five months more than 33 million pounds of edible nuts have been imported into the United States from these European countries, and that this was in excess of any previous importation over a period of one year.

"Although I believe we should expend our every effort to prevent starvation in Europe," Norblad

stated, "it seems unreasonable to me that these highly nutritious nuts, which admittedly are rich in vitamins and high in calories, should be imported in ever-increasing quantities to the United States instead of being consumed in the European countries where they are needed. As an example, the importations of almonds have increased this year 200 per cent over the average pre-war figure. The calorie content of almonds is equivalent to 220 thousand bushels of wheat. The calorie content of wheat is exactly the same thing is true in varying degrees of other nuts imported into this country."

The congressman emphasized the fact that our domestic nut producers are becoming very seriously injured by these importations, which are reducing the income of many thousand American citizens. He said that although he realizes the difficulties of placing quotas on these importations under the reciprocal trade agreements now in operation, he has urged the state department, when negotiating its next trade agreement with these countries, to require inclusion of these particular quotas.

### Grove Post Office Now First Class

Forest Grove post office has been raised to the status of first class office effective July 1 according to official notice received by Postmaster H. T. Smith.

The advance marks a more than \$10000 income annually and gives Forest Grove a better chance for a federal building. Full resumption of mail service gives Forest Grove seven incoming mails and five outgoing each day.

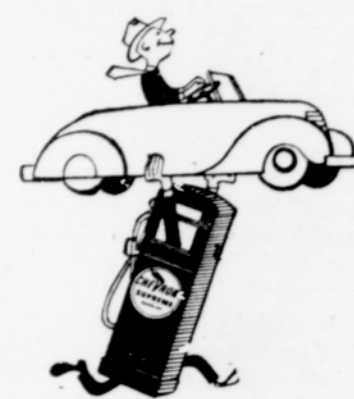
