Barbara Walters and Arla Jean Linkey spent Thursday at Silver Creek Falls.

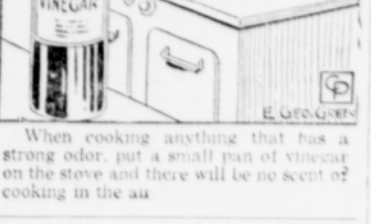

#### Army Re-enlists Cpl. Slogoski

Cpl. Benjamin R. Slogoski of Gaston re-enlisted in the army for three years, according to a report from the Portland army recruiting office covering the last few days of June.

Four other Washington county boys enlisted. They are: William G. Springer, Beaverton, the AAF theatre unassigned; Slogoski and Nelson Jr., Hillsboro, the medical corps, in the Caribbean; Wallace A. Branch, Beaverton, the AAF unassigned; James I. Monahan, Beaverton, for three years, branch and theatre unassigned. Slogoski was also not assigned to any particular theatre.

Upon commission candidates will serve on aircraft carriers or with other units in the navy or marine corps, it was explained.
