ALLOHA-HUBER—The United States post office department has approved the proposed rural route out of the Aloha post office. Service will begin November 1. The new route, sponsored by the Aloha Grange, was planned by Mr. and Mrs. Frank Epplett, who did most of the work necessary to establishing a new postal route by circulating petitions, mapping the route, and seeing that all necessary steps were completed. The route will serve the area in and around Aloha which has heretofore been served by Beaverton routes. It will bring a more efficient service to the affected area as well as associate Aloha residents more closely with their home community and make location by name and address much simpler.

Corn Elected as State Adjutant

Fred Corn, formerly of Hillsboro and now of Portland, was re-elected adjutant of the Oregon department of Veterans of Foreign Wars at the annual state convention at Corvallis last week. Earl C. Mead of Portland was named commander to succeed Peter Fredericksen, all of Portland.

Mrs. Ora J. Windus of Portland was elected president of the women's organization.

Vet Board Sought

Earlier the delegates asked the abolition of the state department of veterans' affairs, suggesting, instead, a six-man commission. As now constituted, a resolution held, the department has failed to provide proper service. The proposed commission would be appointed by the governor after member recommendations were made by veterans' organizations.

In another resolution the legislature is asked to determine whether or not a cash bonus should be made as adjusted service pay. A third paper asks legislators make mandatory a half-mile levy in each county to raise funds for assistance to former servicemen.

State Dues Upped

The convention also accepted a \$1 per year per member boost in state dues to raise money for veterans' rehabilitation. All profits from the state newspaper will also go for that purpose for five years.

Construction as soon as possible of adequate hospital building to house the regional office of the veterans' administration in Portland was also asked. Temporary quarters in Swan island buildings were asked for the present.

Buildings Being Readied for Fair

Complete renovation of the county fair buildings at Shute park, Hillsboro, has started in preparation for the 1946 Washington County fair, according to Leon Davis of Laurel, fair manager. Fair dates are August 25, 30 and 31.

Granges and Farm Union locals are being notified that the fair board has increased the premium on agricultural booths from \$25 to \$50.

Davis also announced that by July 15 the county fair headquarters will be located at the Walker & Nelson insurance office, 112 S. Third avenue, phone 1732. The county fair board is scheduled to meet at the Hillsboro chamber of commerce rooms tonight (Thursday) at 8 o'clock to discuss the program for the 1946 fair and movement of equipment to the new grounds for next year.

South Twin Lake Yields Big Catches

During the opening day, June 29, at South Twin Lake 84 boatloads of anglers checked out 1350 trout while the second day's catches totaled 900, according to a release from the Oregon State Game commission.

In 1945 the fish catches were 980 and 950 for the first two days. This is the second season the lake has been open since the game commission closed it several years ago after poisoning all the trash fish in the lake and restocking it with rainbow trout.

per cent milk and 66 cents for a quart of cream, also a price of 10 cents per quart for skim milk and 11 cents for buttermilk.

Most Washington county distributors were believed to be following the general two cent per quart price increase.

Will W. Henry, manager of the Dairy Co-operative association, said "The price of milk is not going up. This action means that the cost of milk is going to be collected in a different way. Instead of asking our children to pay this cost in taxes 25 years from now, we are going to pay the full cost now and pay it directly to the producer. This will be cheaper in the long run as it eliminates the expense of supporting governmental agencies to handle these subsidies."

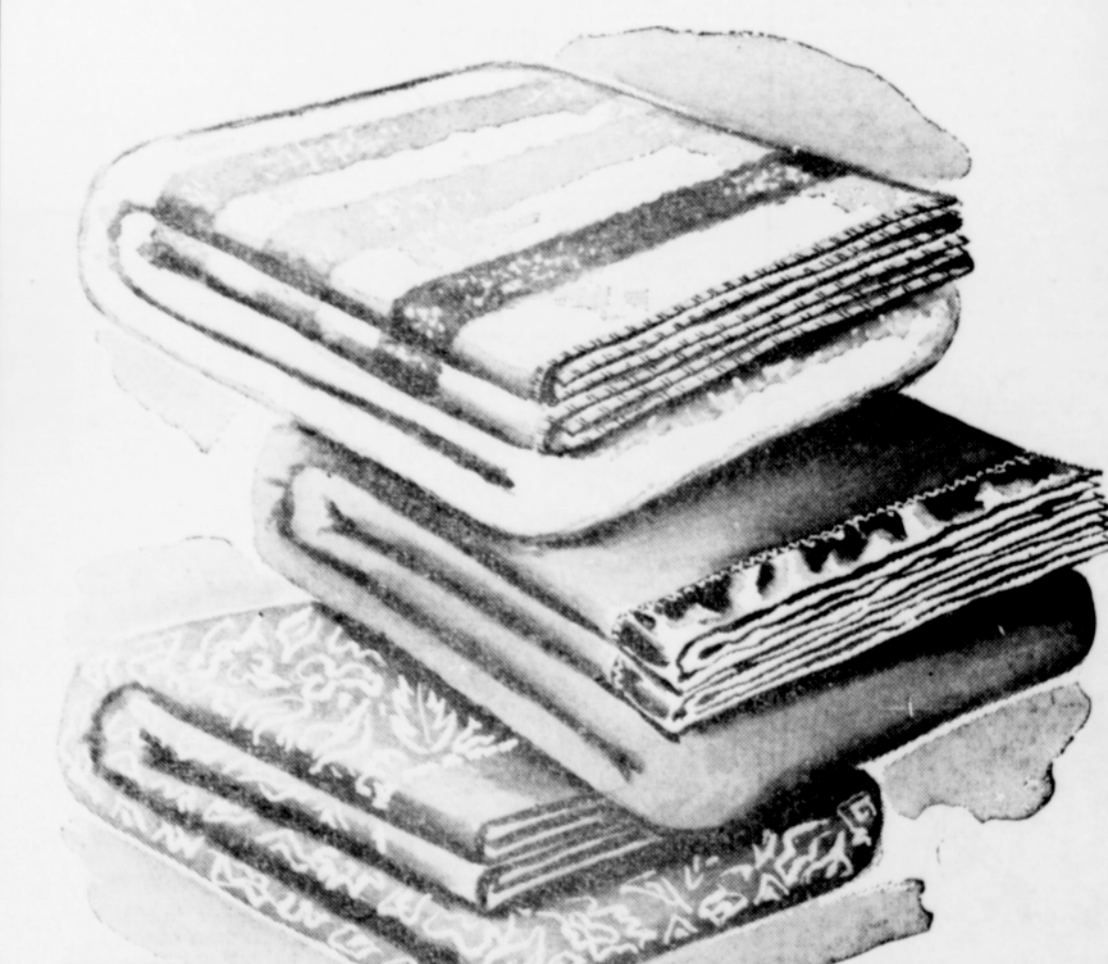
