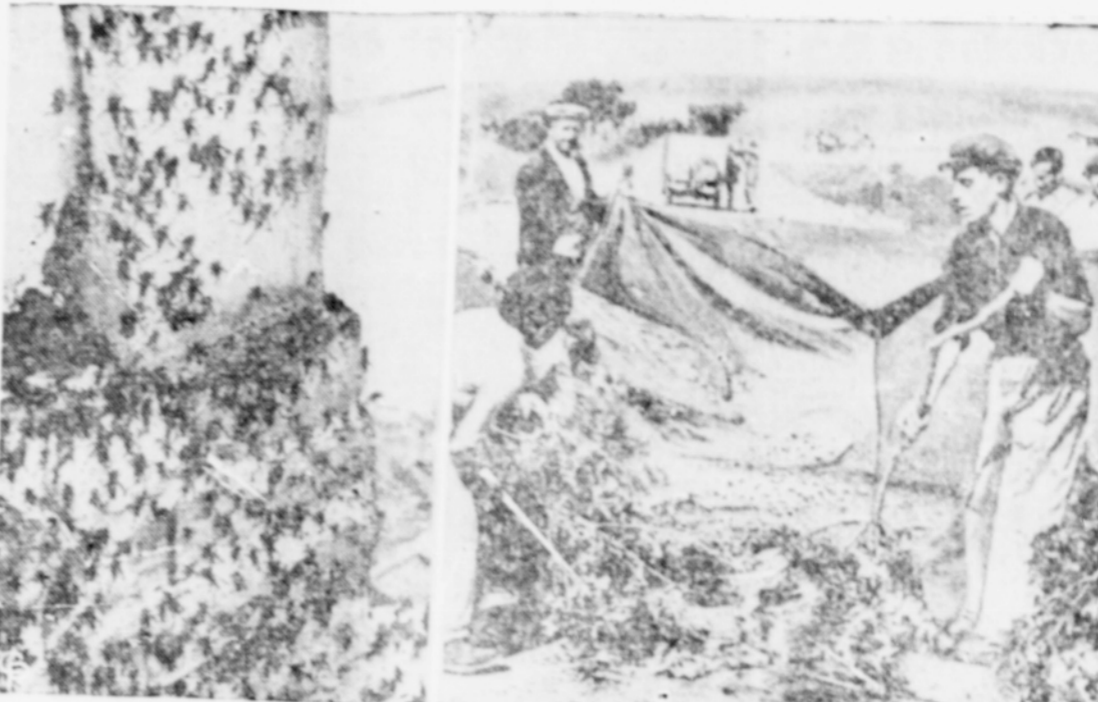
Mrs. Reh Leaves
