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A Break for Oregon Country

In "Canyon Passage," the world premiere of which was shown in Portland Saturday night, Ernest Haycox, noted Oregon author, and Walter Wanger, producer, have combined to give this state a break throughout the country.

In the story and picture Mr. Haycox makes an outstanding contribution to his state in faithfully portraying the life and hardships of pioneer days. The famed author has come to be recognized as the leader in the writing of western fiction. In addition to this he is an upstanding citizen, giving generously of his time and ability in state and local affairs.

Ernest Haycox is not unknown to local people for he has spoken before the Rotary club and, in particular, a number of Hillsboro boys of '17 served with him in Company B, 162nd infantry (the old Third Oregon). These former comrades in World War I take justifiable pride in the place that their one time buddy has won in the literary field and the recognition and honor that have been given him.

Alert to Inefficiency

Congressman Walter Norblad of the first district is giving plenty of evidence that he is very much on the job and alert to mismanagement. The first instance was when he brought out information about the great amount of waste by the navy when the whole world is so badly in need of food and other supplies.

The Congressional Record of July 3 reports how Congressman Norblad called attention to two Oregonian clippings of the same date, which he has inserted in the Record. One clipping is a Washington dispatch authorized by CPA telling of plans for a scrap drive to remedy the "steel shortage which threatens the vital steel industry" and of plans to raise the price in order to alleviate this condition.

The second is a local story from Portland telling of a sale where that day by the War Assets Administration to "Italian representatives" of 16,000 tons of surplus U. S. government steel at a price of \$800,000.

The former army officer and congressman from this district very logically pointed out before the house that "there may be explanatory facts behind these two stories of which I am not cognizant, but certainly it is an inescapable conclusion that this is just further proof of lack of governmental co-ordination and co-operation and, by the same token, of contradictory government bungling."

This same contradiction was noted by others who thought it a mighty strange affair and a flagrant case of inefficiency.

Keep Alive the Pioneer Spirit

As suggested by Ex-Governor Walter Pierce in speaking before the Washington County Native Sons and Daughters, the story of the Oregon pioneers should be retold and retold to the coming generations so that they will better appreciate the hardships that these men and women went through in blazing the trail to Oregon and laying the foundation for the great state of today. The entire country would be better off today if more of the spirit of the pioneer prevailed.

Full support should be accorded by native sons and daughters to their organization in order that their work of perpetuating the memory of the pioneer through their annual meetings and the maintenance of the historical museum here. The museum in the Hillsboro library has been built up through the loving toil of the late Albert Tozier and his sister, the late Mrs. Edythe Tozier Weathered, and in later years by John M. Brown, as county historian. The preservation of those things identified with the early history of this area will be appreciated more and more as the years go on and should prove of great value to students.

Considerable complaint has been received about night airplane flights interfering with sleep, particularly during the Fourth of July. Interference with sleep is not appreciated by those who must necessarily work during the day. In the interest of public goodwill toward aviation, it would seem desirable to change the flight pattern to avoid flying at regular intervals over the same areas and in some cases to fly at greater heights.

It should be remembered that mass production, a major American contribution to the world, is fundamentally based on the idea that low prices make for volume and that volume is the key to success. America's free economy has given us the highest standard of living in the world. We cannot but believe that it will only be the greedy few who are likely to take advantage of the lack of controls and, if they do, public reaction through possible buyer strikes, etc., may bring about a return to reason.

A sound stand is taken by the American Legion when it recommends that the United States be extremely realistic and proceed warily in sharing its atomic secrets lest its policy become one of appeasement rather than an instrument for lasting peace. The futility of appeasement has been clearly demonstrated in recent years. Most other nations have been very realistic in their relations with this country has been too idealistic as witness the sinking of U. S. battleships following World War I as an example for the world. Other powers scrapped theirs on paper.

When one senator can delay action on legislation vital to the nation it is high time that senate rules be revised. Whether or not one likes OPA the fact that one senator was able to prevent action on a measure that would have given interim controls is a condition that is not good for the country.

Veterans' Mail Bag

As a service to veterans in the community, this newspaper publishes a weekly column of questions from veterans and contact men of the Veterans' Administration in this area. For more detailed information, veterans should contact or write to the nearest VA contact unit at 1 O. O. F. building, 16th and Salmon, Portland.

Q: I am receiving training under the vocational rehabilitation program (Public Law 16). Will I be allowed additional subsistence for my child which is to be born this month? A: You are allowed in addition to your subsistence of \$90 as a married veteran, \$10 for the first child and \$7 for each additional child if your combined pension and basic subsistence are less than \$115 a month, you are also entitled to additional subsistence to bring your monthly income to that amount.

Q: How long do I have in which to pay service, my VA using the government guarantee under the G. I. Bill? A: The bill provides for a maximum of 25 years to pay. However, the lending agency will set the time limit, which in most cases does not exceed 20 years.

Q: Can I be treated at a VA hospital for malaria even though my service record does not show evidence of the disease? A: Yes. The VA rules that malaria may be service connected even though no attacks occurred prior to the veteran's release from the service.

Q: I have leased a small grocery store, partially stocked. I feel that it will be a much better business if I lease the stock. Is it possible for me to obtain a guaranteed loan for this purpose? A: If a lending agency considers your venture sound and is willing to lend under the circumstances, the VA will guarantee the loan beyond the length of the lease.

Q: Is there any time limit for dependents of a soldier killed in service or pension? A: No. However, for the pension payments to begin from the date following death, the claim must be filed within one year from date of death. Otherwise payments will start as of the date claim was filed. Parents must prove dependency.

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Chemistry Helps On Perspiration Stains in Summer

Summer garments that hang unworn in the closet because of odorous perspiration stains can sometimes be reclaimed. These stains will often come out with ordinary washing or dry cleaning, but a little elementary chemistry first will sometimes help restore color, says Miss Lucy Lane, a chemist and clothing specialist at Oregon State college.

Body perspiration is usually acid, so counteract fresh stains with an alkali, she explains. Dampen the spot with water and hold it for a few minutes over the fumes from a bottle of ammonia water. Or, for cotton linen and other material that do not water-spot, dilute the ammonia water to half strength, apply a few drops directly to the stain, and rub with your fingers. Ammonia water affects some dyes, so have white vinegar water handy to stop the action if the alkali if the fabric begins to change color.

Perspiration stains that have been allowed to "set" for a few days may become alkaline. So, if an old stain fails to respond to the ammonia water treatment, reverse the process and use vinegar—a milk acid. Miss Lane adds: "Sponging with vinegar sometimes restores color, though an old stain is more difficult to remove than a fresh one."

Yellow perspiration stains on white material will sometimes disappear when bleached in the sun after washing with soap and water. For stubborn stains, sponge with hydrogen peroxide. Or, quickly dip the stained spot into a solution of two teaspoons sodium hydrosulfite to one pint water and rinse immediately. This is a powerful bleaching agent, so use this bleach before using. Perspiration odors sometimes can not yet ready for the laundry or dry cleaner. Sponge the spot with warm water to which a few drops of vinegar have been added. Sprinkle the perspiration into the cloth then let stand one to two hours, keeping the spot moist. Brush off the powder and rinse well.
