Those for which increases were reported included bent-grass, red and yellow-green grasses, chewing and other types of fescues, hairy vetch, and smooth bromegrass. Alfalfa, white clover, field peas, and annual ryegrasses all showed decreases compared with the previous year.

There was a sharp increase in imports of vegetable seeds into the United States during the year ended June 30. Items showing largest increase were garden peas, spinach, cabbage, cauliflower, kale, and radish. Imports of onion seed, sweet corn and beets, however, were lower.

Imports of garden beans were in excess of 630,000 pounds, and spinach nearly 280,000 pounds. Almost none of either came in the previous year. Imports of cabbage seeds jumped from about 500 pounds in 1944 to about 30,000 pounds during the year ended June 30. Cauliflower imports were in excess of 3,400 pounds compared with only 10 pounds the previous year.

Imports of onion seed dropped from 271,000 pounds in 1944-45 to about 120,000 the past season.

Most of the garden seed imports come from the Netherlands, Denmark, and Canada.

Average Prices of Clean Seed for Oregon-Grown Cover Crops Given

At the beginning of the harvest period for Oregon-grown cover crops, average prices quoted to growers for clean seed were 12 cents a pound for hairy vetch, six cents for Willamette vetch, and four cents for Austrian winter peas, according to figures received by Palmer S. Torvend, manager of the Oregon extension service from USDA.
