Vets Changing Jobs Advised To Contact VA

Veterans who are taking on-the-job training were advised today by the Veterans Administration not to quit their jobs or transfer to other employment without notifying the VA first.

Tom Craig, VA contact representative in Hillsboro, explained that failure to do so may jeopardize a veteran's chance to resume training at a later date.

It is to his positive advantage to consult with a VA training officer or contact representative before quitting his training or taking another job, Craig stated. The VA will help the veteran set up a new program of education or job training, or will arrange to postpone his use of G.I. training rights until a later date.

Changes are permitted only for good reasons, as the VA intends that the veteran should utilize his educational benefits primarily to further a life-long occupation, Craig pointed out.

A change of objective in a training program requires the counsel of advisers in the VA guidance section. In Oregon, there are VA guidance centers in Portland, Corvallis, Eugene and La Grande, and training officers also at Klamath Falls, Medford and Astoria.

VA's contact man here will aid local veterans with their problems under the G.I. bill any time on Thursdays between 8 a. m. and 4:30 p. m. at the city hall in Hillsboro.

Sugar-Scant Cake Fillings

By BETSY NEWMAN

IF YOU make a cake for Sunday on your baking day, you'll probably like to make some kind of filling. I've been leafing through cook books picking up recipes that use little if any sugar. Maybe you can find one or two that will answer your needs.

Today's Menu

Swiss Steak Mashed Potatoes
Creamed Cabbage
Fresh Young Carrots
Cake Coffee

Maple Cream Filling

2 c. maple 1 tbsp. butter
syrup Salt
¼ c. milk

Cook syrup, milk, butter and salt together in the soft ball stage (238 deg. F.). Cool and beat until creamy. Use as cake filling.

Orange Filling

2 tbsp. butter 2 eggs, beaten
or margarine 1 tbsp. grated
¼ c. granulated sugar rind
sugar 1 tbsp. lemon
juice

Combine all ingredients and mix well. Cook over hot water, stirring constantly, until well thickened, about 10 mins. Chill well before

spreading on cake.

Whipped Cream Filling
½ tsp. gelatin 2 c. cream
¼ c. cold water 1 tsp. vanilla
¼ c. powdered sugar ¼ c. boiling water

Soak gelatin in the cold water until softened. Whip the cream in a pan set in ice water and sift sugar over it; add vanilla. Pour the boiling water upon the gelatin, and when it is dissolved and cooled, strain it over the whipped cream, then beat rapidly with a flat whip, turning the pan with the left hand while beating with the right.

Beat until the gelatin is thoroughly blended with the cream. Set in a cool place and when filling is nearly stiff, spread on cake layers.

Whipped Cream Mocha Filling

½ pt. whipping 1½ tbsp. mocha
cream extract or
2 tbsp. sugar strong coffee

Whip the cream in a low set in ice water. If the cream, bowl a. 1 beater are all thoroughly chilled beforehand, this will not be necessary. Add the extract or coffee and sugar; beat well. If the top of the cake is spread with this filling, ¼ c. of chopped nut meats may be sprinkled over it.
