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County Taxes Up For Coming Year
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Millage for Forest Grove rural fire protection district remains the same at 6 and the levy gains only from \$1,626.11 to \$1,663.44. Valuation increases from \$2,710,189.28 to \$2,772,407.75. West Slope fire protection district has the same millage and no increase and only a tax levy gain from \$912.84 to \$962.44 with an increase in valuation from \$1,521,338.45 to \$1,604,064.35. Cornelius rural fire protection district has a drop in levy from \$2,004.81 to \$1,061.32 and decrease in levy from \$854,672.32 to \$864,537.84.

Hillsboro elementary school district No. 7 has a gain in millage from 14.7 to 25.3 and an overall total millage increase from 45.3 to 82.5. Some of the larger increases in valuation of elementary districts were due to consolidations. West Union No. 1, for instance, increasing from \$344,617.76 to \$1,113,720.48.

Dr. Parker Heads OSC Poultry Staff

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Dr. Jesse E. Parker, at present chairman of the poultry department at North Dakota Agricultural college, will be the new head of the department of poultry husbandry at Oregon State college starting September 15. President A. L. Strand has announced. He succeeds the late Hubert Cobby.

The new appointee, who will be on both the teaching and research staff, has a broad background of training for the type of work carried on at OSC. A native of Alabama, he obtained his college training at the state universities of Tennessee, Louisiana and Missouri, getting his Ph. D. degree at Missouri where he studied under Dr. Fred B. McKenzie, now professor of animal husbandry at OSC.

Much of Dr. Parker's previous research work has been in the field of reproduction which is being emphasized in the college department. Points out William A. Schoenfeld, dean and director of agriculture, "Just 34 years old, he is considered one of the top young men in the field of poultry education and research."

Dr. Parker came to Oregon and conferred with members of the poultry advisory committee before accepting the position. Members of this committee have endorsed his selection enthusiastically, college officials report.

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WHY TELEPHONES CANNOT BE SUPPLIED FASTER TO WAITING APPLICANTS

Excerpt from an advertisement of the Automatic Electric Sales Corp. of Chicago in a May issue of "Telephony," a trade journal of the telephone industry.

"By January of this year, our terminations of government contracts were practically completed, and conversion well under way. We were ready to move swiftly into peacetime production.

"February brought the steel strike and strikes in other basic industries, which resulted in shortages of materials which compelled our factory temporarily to adopt a three-day week. Those shortages continued to hamper production after the strikes were ended.

"In March the situation showed improvement, and production volume began slowly but steadily to increase. In April further gratifying progress was made; we began to 'hit our stride.'

"In the meantime, the coal strike, in progress throughout April, moved swiftly to a climax, resulting in the drastic order for power curtailment through the Chicago area. Our gains in production volume have been wiped out, and the situation for the immediate future remains dark and uncertain. . . .

"It is our intention to work to the limit of our ability to bring about a resumption of high speed production at the earliest possible date."
