Speaker Describes Building Project

spirin tablets could be included. Nearly 200 workers. Moore said the Cedar Hills project, which Commonwealth is sharing the financing with the Equitable Savings & Loan association, is at present employing about 170 men and 20 administrative personnel. When in full production about a year from now the field force will probably number 350 to 400 men.

Cedar Hills will have a complete sewage disposal plant, one of the few outside an incorporated city, it was pointed out. This plant will be developed from Camp Abbott at Bend and will more than take care of the disposal needs of the community when completed.

The business area and the main entrance to Cedar Hills will be on the new super highway where Barnes road joins Sunset highway. One hundred acres have been set aside for this area and a portion of this will be developed in Garden Court apartments surrounding the area, he said.

The site plan of Cedar Hills, done by Harry D. Freeman, follows the contour lines of the rolling hills. Asphalt type streets are planned with curbs and sidewalks throughout, it was explained. The main arteries are to be 100 feet, secondary streets 60 and the minor streets 50.

Moore said "we believe the restrictions being set up in Cedar Hills have never been set up anywhere else in Oregon. The owner of each building site will have one vote in a Home Owners association, which will have the power to tax the land on square foot basis to finance the repairs and upkeep."

The speaker said the business center will be a model of convenience and incorporating the best ideas available in Mr. Potter's development at River Oaks, Houston, Texas, and the new development in Kansas City and Los Angeles.

All buildings in the business area are to be under single ownership. In speaking of the total of nearly \$50,000,000 of building in the county, Moore said "Stop for a moment and try to calculate how much assessed valuation that will add to your tax rolls and how many tax dollars will thereby roll where Mr. and Mrs. Roy Moore don't forget that if this development were not being carried forward on a large scale you would be speaking of the total of nearly \$50,000,000 of building in the county."

Wortman Given Unit Citation

2nd Lt. Kenneth Wortman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Wortman of Hillsboro, who is scheduled for discharge from the army air force at Ft. Lewis, Wash., this week, has been awarded the Western Pacific campaign credit star and Distinguished Unit Citation (DUC). It was announced from headquarters of the 44th bombardment group at Castle field, Merced, Cal.

Wortman, a 1943 graduate of Hillsboro, was overseas for 14 months and flew eight missions from Tinian on a B-29 for the 20th air force. Since January 1 he has been with the 13th air force stationed at Manila.

The 44th bombardment group was cited for outstanding performance of duty in action against the enemy on July 24, 1945, in a daylight bombing raid against the Japanese light metal industries in Osaka. It reads in part: "While the tight formation of B-29s as on its bombing run, one plane offered a direct hit and broke apart with the loss of 11 crew members. Although there was grave danger to the formation from the enemy's anti-aircraft fire, the group did not break formation and held their course."

In this assignment (of rendering the target 100 per cent destroyed) the crews exhibited personal bravery, high professional skill and a common devotion to duty which stand as an example of the highest courage and traditions of gallantry for the army air forces.

Veteran Urges Local AVC Group

Organizing of a local American Veterans Committee (AVC) chapter is being urged by Everett G. Padgett, 30, box 130, Hillsboro. He would like to see a group of veterans contact him or the west coast headquarters at 7509 1/2 Sunset boulevard, Los Angeles, 46, California.

Padgett reports that there are more than 500 state-wide chapters now organized in 43 states including Oregon, and 30 overseas chapters. Padgett was in the navy 39 months, serving on the second carrier "Wasp."

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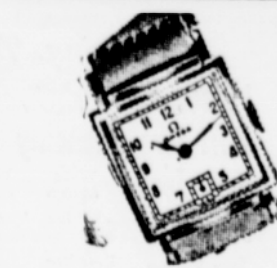
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
