Reasons for Shortage of Teachers Cited by Speaker

have suddenly come to the reali- Grove Rotary club.

Unless the teaching profession is made more attractive it may result in lowering standards or unionization of teachers, asserted Professor Clifford P. Rowe, head of the journalism department at Pacific university, Forest Grove, in speaking before the Rotary club last Thursday on "The Reasons for the Teacher Shortage."

If the education of our youth is not worthwhile don't bother about it, but if good teachers are wanted our legislators, taxpayers and people must do something about it, declared Rowe, who pointed out that under present conditions there will likely be a teacher shortage for five or six years.

Wants Good Educators

The Facific university professor said that he had heard a great deal of criticism of the profession by the teachers themselves and said that he was vitally interested from a selfish standpoint because he wanted his children to have the best teachers.

The shortage, he said, is not the result of the war because men and women started leaving the teaching profession prior to the war. The bottom of the bucket has been scraped and the quality of some of the teachers is bound to be worse under such conditions, haid.

Salary schedules of some of the larger schools are proving a handicap with the result that some small schools, realizing that they have to bay more, are outbidding them, asserted Rowe.
