## Blooming Trips Troutman Store In Play-off Tilt

With defeat staring them in the face, Blooming's softballers suddenly woke up with a three-run start in the first of the seventh inning to beat Troutman Store of North Plains, 4 to 2, last Thursday night and annex the National league championship.

The one-game play-off between the first and second half winners of the National league was light from start to finish and the North Plains outfit almost turned the tables, holding a 2-to-1 lead when Manager Walt Ruckler's team came to bat for the last time.

Wild base-running cost Troutman several possible tallies in the first inning when men were thrown out at third and at the plate. Blooming drew first blood in the second when Ruckler drove in a run with a high fly to center.

Troutman Store grabbed a one-run lead in the last of the fourth when First Sacker Glenn Solders drove in two runs after two were out on a line single to the out-field. That set the stage for Blooming's

## Perfection Traveling Squad Announced

Chuck Ingram, manager of Hillsboro's Perfection Bakery softball team which won the district 12 title Tuesday night, has announced a traveling squad of 16 men for the state tournament in Oregon City next week.

The squad: Robert Halvorson and Frank Heinrich, catchers; Franklin McCoy, Walter Ruckler and Ingram, pitchers; Bill Crandall, first base; Howard Schorn, second base; Dale Frantz, third base; Don Nelson, shortstop; Don and Bill Foelker, Jack Parsons and Aubrey VanLoon, outfielders; Harry Frantz, utility infielder; Cliff Betzer, pitcher and infielder; Lou Heinrich, coach.

Ingram's last ditch three-run rally in the first of the seventh. Art Gurske led off with a single over first, and he scored a few moments later from third on a passed ball. Fred Muhly hit a timely double to drive across the last two runs.

Perfection's only unbeaten team left in the tournament after Saturday night, rested Monday while its chief challenger, Blooming, smashed out a top-sided 23-to-3 triumph over Beaverton. The Beaverton team had beaten Blooming on opening night, 7 to 3, scoring all of its runs in a big first-of-the-seventh rally.

Bill Troutman, who shared pitching duties for Blooming with Manager Walt Ruckler, and also played left field, turned in the tourney's best mound performance Saturday night, setting Forest Grove down with only one hit while Blooming won by a narrow score of 5 to 4. Forest Grove held a lead of 3 to 0 going into the second inning.

Perfection started in early to clinch its Tuesday night win over Blooming, rolling over six runs on three hits off Troutman in the first inning aided by two errors. The bakery team added two tallies in the third inning, another pair in the fourth, and pushed over No. 11 in the last of the sixth. Blooming got one run in the fifth, two in the sixth, and had a big last-inning spree of five runs on six hits before falling.

Perfection was out-hit 11 to 8, but had only two errors to six for the losers. Ingram's sluggers had at least one big spire in every tour-

## Oregon Game Commission Sets Gun Regulations

Gun regulations for the 1946 hunting season have been made by the Oregon State game commission to safeguard both hunters and game. Shortage of ammunition and regulations were considered so that regulations are as liberal as feasible to avoid excessive crippling loss of game, according to a release from the game commission office in Portland.

General regulations state that the use of machine guns, M1 military carbines, Garand (M1) rifles, and Johnson rifles are illegal for hunting all game. The carbine is too light a weapon for big game. The Garand and Johnson are the only

clip-fed semi-automatic rifles available, and at rapid fire they are difficult to control. Sportsmen should remember that these guns can kill a man two miles away. The use of .22 calibre rim-fire shells is also prohibited for hunting any game birds, deer or elk. Shot guns loaded with bird or buck shot cannot be used to hunt big game. Elk gun regulations require that rifles must be .30 calibre or larger, or must use bullets weighing at least 150 grains or generating at least 1400 pounds of energy at 100 yards range. The more common calibre guns which are illegal for elk 218, 219, 22, 220, 25, 25-20 and the 25-35. Certain cartridges of 6.5 MM and 250-3000 rifles do not qualify under this regulation. It is recommended that hunters using these weapons consult ballistic tables for bullets they wish to use. Long bows and barbed broad-head hunting arrows may be used to hunt big game and migratory waterfowl. Expert archers recommend that a forty-pound bow and a one-ounce arrow with a 7.8-inch broadhead be used. Regulations do not require this.

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## Perfection Bakery Softball Nine Wins District 12 Championship

A hard-hitting and smooth-fielding Perfection Bakery softball nine swept through the district 12 tournament unbeaten, clinching its bid for a berth in the state tournament with an 11-to-8 win over Blooming Tuesday night.

Manager Chuck Ingram's outfit collected wins over the other three tourney entries, opening Friday night with a 13-to-4 win over the Forest Grove All-Stars. On Saturday night the state-tournament and bakery nine rolled over Beaverton by a 13-to-6 score.
